

Series Of Short Courses Set By Penn State Univ.

Dr. Fica C. Snyder, director of Penn State short courses, recently announced three courses that will be taught this summer, and the introduction of a pest-control technicians program to be offered during the winter term.

The plant materials short course will be taught July 5-9. It will include tree, shrub, and vine identification and selection, plant materials laboratory, general maintenance — including pruning, planting and fertilization, insect and disease control; lawn establishment and maintenance; soil improvement and rock gardens.

The course is designed for homeowners who desire to improve and beautify their properties and make more efficient utilization of their grounds.

Individuals over 16 years of age are eligible. The University housing and dining facilities are available. The course fee is \$15.

An annual beekeepers short course, scheduled for August 16-20, will feature all phases of honey production and marketing. The time will be divided equally between the classroom and commercial bee yards.

Registration fee is \$8.50 for state residents 16 years of age or more.

Other area supervisors receiving service awards at the conference were Harold Lindcamp, Peach Bottom R2 — 15 years; Owen Etter, Dean Amick, Morgantown J. Wilson House, Lampeter, — all ten years. Three supervisors from Lebanon County also received 10-year awards: Leon Arnold, John Arnold and Arthur Kunkle.

The annual horseman's short course will be a two-day affair on August 17-19.

Subjects to be covered are: horse parasites and their control; nutrition; foot care; records and record keeping; selection of foundation stock; taxes; fitting; pasture and forages; buildings and equipment; teaching students to ride and judging.

The registration fee for residents is \$10.

The training program for pest control technicians is offered during the winter term to provide training needed for jobs in that field. It consists of two eight-week terms a year in each of two years. A six-month summer placement program between the second and third terms is recommended for on-the-job training.

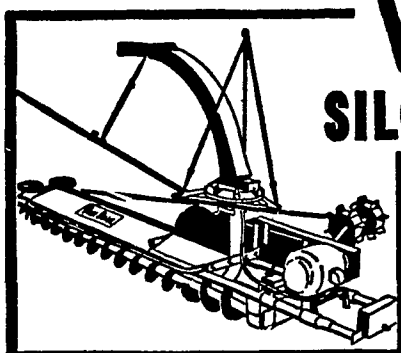

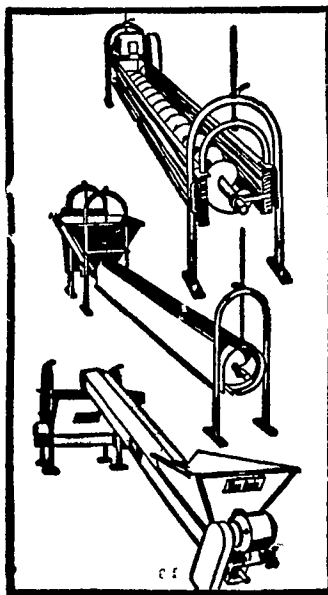

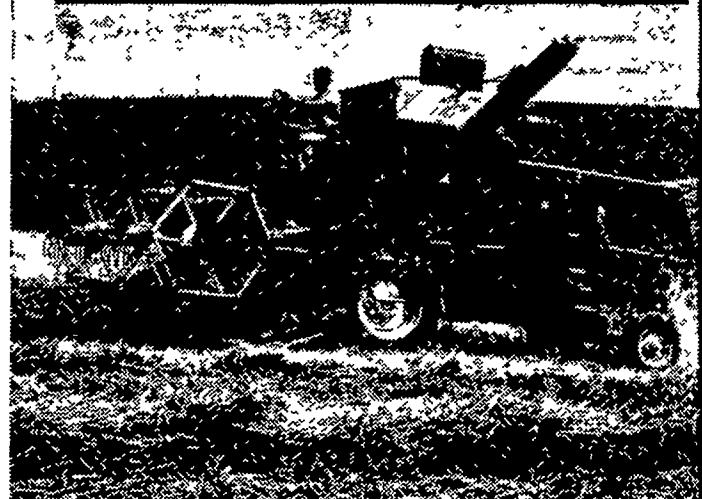
