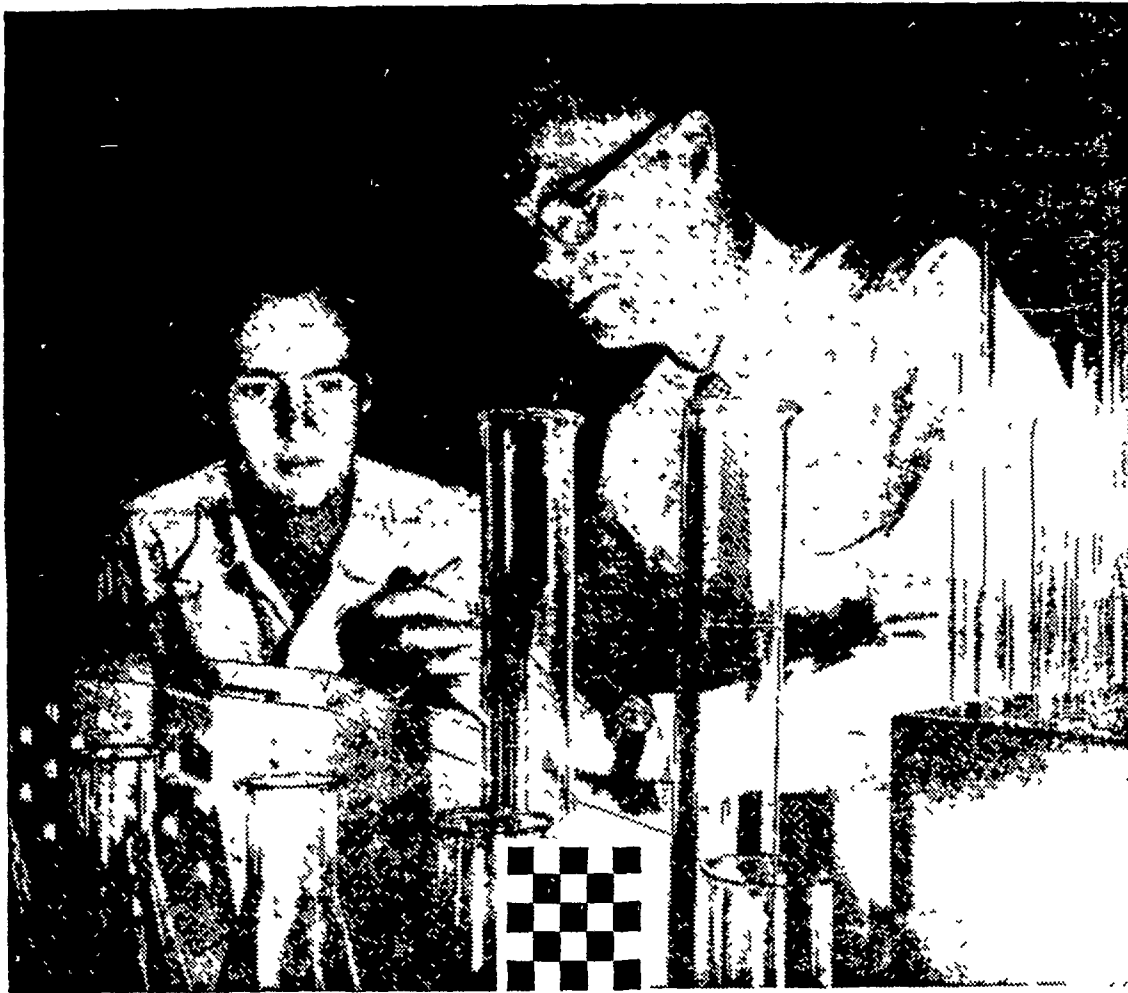

PA. CATTLE ON FEED UP

Pennsylvania cattle feeders had an estimated 50,000 cattle and calves on grain feed for slaughter market on July 1, or 7,000 more than a year ago, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service

There were 35,000 fed cattle marketed during the April 1-June 30 quarter, 8 percent less than were marketed during the same quarter a year earlier. Feeders placed 18,000 on feed during the quarter compared with 12,000 a year earlier

Expected marketings of 29,000 fed cattle during the coming quarter, if realized, will be 2,000 more than for the same period in 1964
