LIVE HENS

Prices unchanged to 1/2 cent lower on light and heavy type hens. Offerings of light type irregularly distributed, but over-all supplies adequate. Demand spotty. Heavy type hens continue in light supply, but offerings more readily available as the warm, humid weather was curtailing consumer interest. Some processing plants closing for seasonal vacations. Prices paid at farms: light type hens, 6-7 1/2 cents; heavy type hens, 16-17 1/2 cents.

TURKEYS

Offerings limited. Occasional small lots of heavy type hens moved at 28 cents. Breeder hens reported available at 19-20 cents with few takers.

Broilers and fryers at the Eastern Shore Exchange this week averaged 15.58 cents per pound live weight. This is based on the daily market lot averages for Monday through Thursday. Prices paid ranged from a low of 14.9 cents on Thursday to a high of 16.5, also on Thursday.

Delmarva

July 2, 1965

Delmarva broiler and fryer live prices advanced more than 1/4 cent. Demand good for heavy auction offerings.

Ready-to-cook demand very good with plants unable to accept further orders. Plants reached record production for 2-day slaughter schedule.

Estimated slaughter for Friday and Saturday, 1,295,000 head compared to 919,000 head last weekend.

In the 24-hours preceding market close, broilers and fryers live prices ranged from 14.9-16.5 cents per pound on sales of 1,273,760 head.

Cows steady. Bulls strong to 50 higher. In the carlot dressed beef trade, steer and heifer beef steady to 50 lower, decline mostly on choice. Cow beef steady to 50 lower.
