This change in market news reporting takes into consideration a basic fact in the broiler industry today — the first time the ownership of poultry truly changes hands is when the processor sells the ready-to-cook product to a distributor or retailer in a consuming market.

Thus, these changes will replace the old "live, at-farm base valuation" reporting system in the Southeast with a market news system based on the ready-to-cook prices of broilers. In areas where actual live buying occurs, these prices will continue to be reported.

In the past, market news reports on broiler-fryers represented the price paid for live birds at the farm — that is, the price the producer got from the processor. As long as actual sales took place at the farm, this system worked well.

But the broiler industry has been in a state of change, and today, a change in the ownership of live broilers at the farm seldom occurs in many of the major production areas.
