1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla flavoring
¼ cup toasted sesame seeds

Sift together flour, soda and salt. Blend butter and sugar. Add egg and vanilla; beat well. Stir in sifted dry ingredients together with ½ cup of the corn flake crumbs; mix well. Shape dough into balls about 1 inch in diameter. Combine remaining corn flake crumbs and sesame seeds. Roll balls in corn flake crumb mixture to coat evenly; place 2 inches apart on ungreased baking sheets. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) about 14 minutes or until lightly browned. Makes about 4½ dozen cookies.

NOTE: Sesame seeds may be toasted by heating in moderate oven (350 degrees) for

about 20 minutes, stirring frequently.

For those who love their butterscotch, it's hard to choose — Butterscotch Nut Sauce or Butter-Choc Fruit Sauce.

BUTTERSCOTCH

NUT SAUCE

1 cup (6 ounces) butterscotch morsels
2 tablespoons water
¼ cup corn syrup
½ teaspoon vanilla
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ cup chopped nuts

Combine butterscotch morsels and water; place over hot water till butterscotch melts. Remove from heat and stir in corn syrup, vanilla, and salt. Add chopped nuts and mix well. Serve warm over ice cream. Makes about 1 cup.

**BUTTER-CHOC
FRUIT SAUCE**

1 cup (6 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate morsels
1 cup (6 ounces) butterscotch morsels
½ cup light corn syrup
½ cup orange juice

Combine above ingredients in saucepan and stir over moderate heat till morsels melt and mixture is smooth. Serve warm over ice cream. Makes about 2 cups.

Wilhelm New General Manager For PENB

Dr. L. A. Wilhelm, Director of Poultry Development and Market Research for the Quaker Oats Company, has resigned that post to become General Manager of the Poultry and Egg National Board, it was announced recently by Blanton Smith, PENB President. He succeeds Lloyd H. Geil, who served as General Manager since 1957.

Dr. Wilhelm has been Secretary of the PENB Board since 1947. He was associated with Quaker Oats since 1955.

Ladies, Have You Heard? . . .

SOME TIPS ON CLEANING STAIN-REPELLENT GARMENTS

Garments that are treated to shed both oil and water-type stains won't need frequent laundering.
If food or beverage is spilled on the fabric, most of it will roll right off the surface. Use a cleansing tissue to take off excess food. If you've overlooked a spot and it is dry, remove it with a damp cloth or spot remover.
Launder stain-repellent finished garments in the usual way, but be sure to rinse out all the suds. Traces of suds lower the effectiveness of the finish to prevent stains. Pressing after washing helps to bring back

the original stain repellency. For a change in the meat course for an outdoor meal, try cooking thick slices of bologna over coals. Brown the bologna slices on a hot, greased grill. As the slices brown, spoon barbecue sauce over them. Serve piping hot in buns.

Things to Know About Parsley
Parsley may be one of three types — curled leaved, plain leaved, and celery leaved.

The curled type has large, dark green, and compact leaves. The plain type has plain deeply cut and flat leaves, not curled.

When buying, choose parsley with a bright green color, fresh and free from sand and yellow leaves.

When storing parsley, keep it refrigerated and moist.

Chop and mix in salads or separate in suitable size pieces and use to garnish a meat or vegetable dish or a salad.

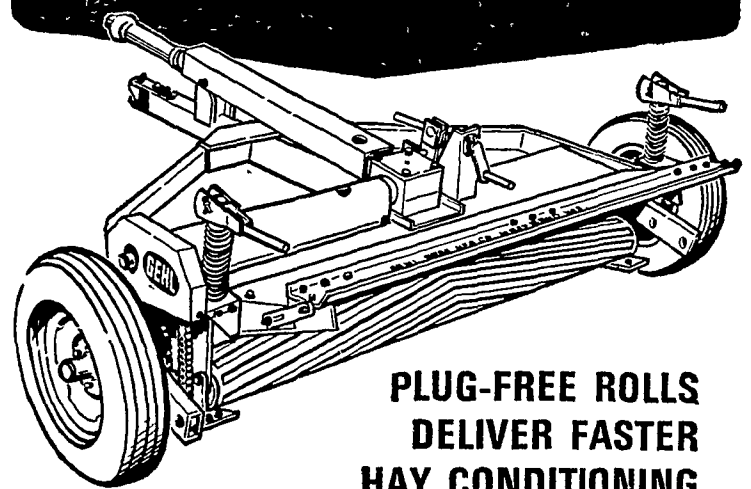
