Center at 8 a.m. on August 18.
First stop will be the new Pensupreme Dairy plant just off the Route 230 Bypass. The group will be shown the latest methods of milk processing being used in the Lancaster area.

Second stop will be in New Holland at the New Holland Machine Co., one of the largest manufacturers of agricultural equipment in the county, with world-wide distribution.

Next, a lunch built around fried chicken and selling for 50c per person will be served in the New Holland Community Park. Anyone wishing to bring their own picnic lunch is welcome to do so.

After lunch, the group will tour Weaver's poultry processing plant, where they will see broilers in various stages on their way to the housewife.

Final stop will be at Tur-

key Hill Dairy at Creswell. This operation is in the process of expanding to 400 cows, or more, and the new buildings under construction represent some of the latest ideas around.
