WEEKLY SUMMARY

LIVE HENS

Prices unchanged on light type hens. Demand fair for light offerings. Interest for heavy type hens only fair for adequate offerings. Occasional flocks sold at 16c. Prices paid at farms: Light Type hens 7-8½, mostly 7½-8¼c. Heavy type hens, too few to report.

TURKEYS

Demand fair for hens, good for toms. Supplies fully adequate on hens, light on toms. Prices on heavy type 13-15# hens ranged 23-23½c. A few heavy type 25-28# toms sold at 23c.

Broilers and fryers live prices on the Eastern Shore Exchange averaged 16.54 cents per lb. this week, up .33 cent over last week's average.

Prices paid ranged from a high of 17.3 cents on Tuesday to a low of 15.4 on Thursday.

Sales for the week totaled 1,232,000 head, nearly ½-million head less than the preceding week.

Delmarva live broiler and fryer prices declined approximately ¼ cent with only fair demand for moderate auction offerings.

Ready-to-cook demand irregular, ranging from fair to good. Feature activity for next week based on an unchanged to slower market; undertone slightly unsettled.

Estimated slaughter for this weekend 949,000 head, compared to 852,000 head last weekend.

In the 24-hours preceding market close on Friday, broilers and fryers live prices ranged from 15.4-16.5 cents per lb. on sales of 1,101,800 head.

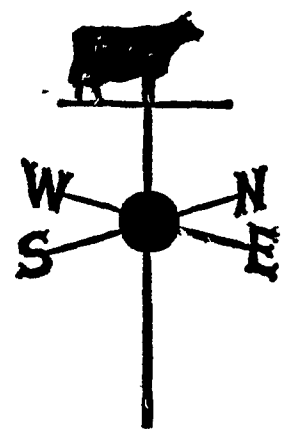
