New Food Technology Major Now Offered At Penn State Univ.

The Pennsylvania State University announces it is offering a new undergraduate major in food technology, starting this September at University Park.

The major in food technology is a scientific approach to processing, packaging, and development of foods, says Donald V. Josephson, chairman of the committee administering the program in the College of Agriculture.

Development of the new major, Josephson states, recognizes the trend among food processing companies for more scientifically trained personnel as well as more varied operations. In Pennsylvania alone, opportunities exist for capable food technologists in nearly 3,000 food manufacturing and processing plants which add over three billion dollars to the State's economy each year.

College of Agriculture departments cooperating in the new major are animal industry and nutrition, agricultural engineering, dairy science, horticulture, and poultry science.

Students will take the usual undergraduate courses in the basic sciences as well as in writing and speaking skills, social sciences, humanities, and economics. An additional 18 elective credits are available for studies in major areas of interest or combinations of various courses.

While many of the courses in food technology are new, an experienced faculty has been drawn from the food research staff in the College of Agriculture. A scholarship program is being developed to aid students
