 Several suggestions were of-

ferred, but no conclusions were reached.

The first choice was for March 8, with the 10th as an

alternate choice. The names of several possible speakers for the meeting were also discussed.

Amos Funk, district chairman, in discussing various county and state plans for future development, said that many call for keeping good, number one and two agricul-

tural land in production, but none of them spell out just how this is to be done. He also suggested that in any long range planning, he hoped the county commission would take advantage of the dis-

trict's knowledge and experience.

John Kitch, state forester cooperating with the soil and water district, suggested it will not only be important to keep in close communication with the county planners but with township planners and supervisors also.

Ruben Keesee, soil conservation technician, reported on the conservation work done in the county during the month of August. There were 7 new cooperators signed; 38 landowners served; 10 landowners applying practices; 1 consultive services; 5 ACP referrals; 800 lineal feet of diversion terraces; 8 acres waterways; 3 acres pasture and hayland planting; 80 acres strip cropping; 950 lineal feet of cropland terrace; 173 acres of land adequately treated; 1 acres of cropland to grassland and 73 services provided.

Six new cooperator agreements were unanimously approved by the directors for a total of 332 acres.
