Angus Dominate Steer Show At Ephrata Fair

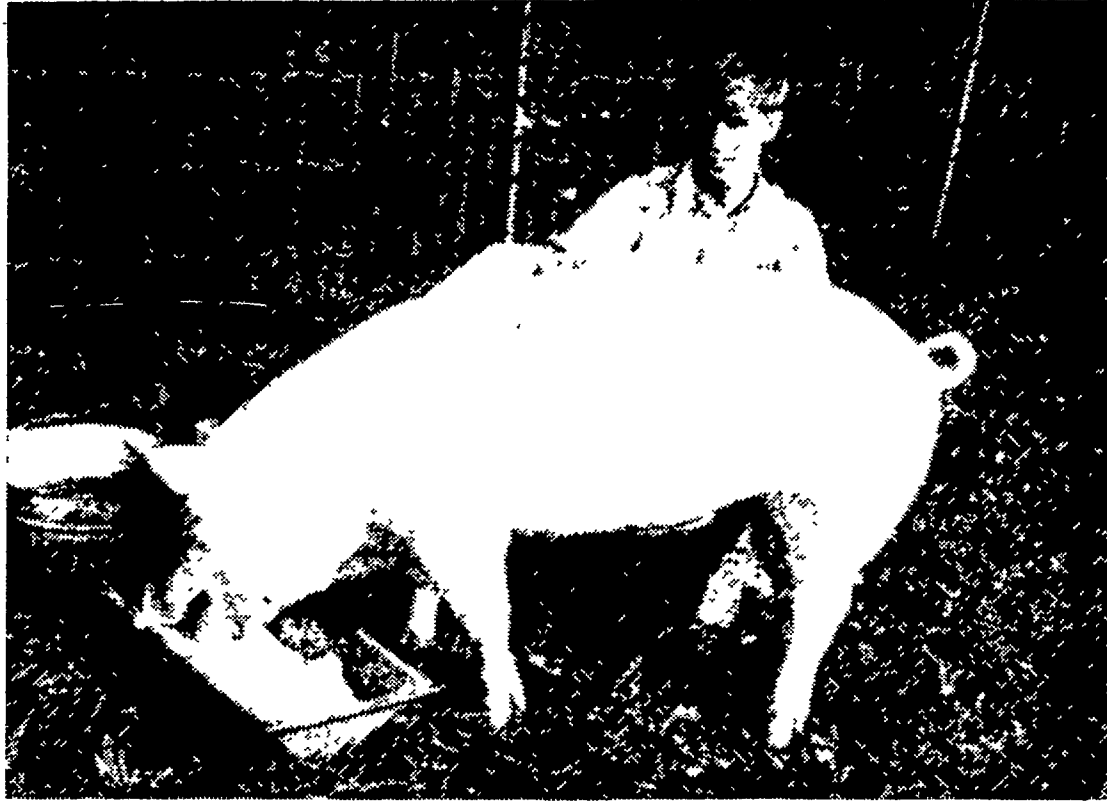

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Court Ruling Finds "Chains" Are Packers

A U.S. District Court has ruled that two national food chains, Safeway Stores, Inc., and The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co., Inc., are meat packers subject to the jurisdiction of the Packers and Stockyards Act, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has reported.

The judgment was entered in the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia on Sept. 13.

The Court ruled that the firms' manufacture and preparation of meat and meat food products for shipment in commerce constitute the operations of a packer within the meaning of that term as defined in the P & S Act. The

Dairy Co-Ops Petition Sec. On Milk Pricing

Dairy cooperatives in the New York-New Jersey milk producing area have filed a joint telegraphic petition with Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman asking for suspension of a portion of the fluid milk pricing formula for the months of October, November and December.

The joint telegram, signed by the presidents of the four cooperatives pointed up the situation in the milk producing area, stating that drought conditions continue; that production costs have increased 2 1/2% since the same time last year, dairy feed costs are up 5%, while hay prices are up 15%; and pasture conditions are only 50% of normal for this season of the year.

Greider Leghorn Farms, Inc. Wins Penna. 8th Random Sample Test

A Shaver Starcross 288 entry from Greider Leghorn Farms, Inc., Mount Joy, has been announced the winner of the Eighth Pennsylvania Random Sample Egg Laying Test which concluded on September 8, 1965.

In topping the 32-entry field, the Greider birds shelled-out 2743 eggs per pullet housed, 325 eggs higher than the test average. But to win the contest they had to return the greatest net income over feed and chick cost, which they did with a figure of \$2524 per bird. The test average was \$1916.

Also in terms of return over feed and chick costs, Lancaster County hatcheries had the second and third high entries. They were Keystone Poultry Breeding Farm, Terre Hill, with \$2491 net return; and Babcock Hatchery, Latitz R3, with \$2475 return per bird.
