Area Veterinarians On 3-Week Flying Tour Of European Countries

Three area veterinarians are part of a 31-member group from the Pennsylvania Veterinary Medical Association who are presently on a three-week flying tour of Russia, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Germany, Sweden and Denmark.

Local veterinarians making the trip are Dr. H. L. Todd Addis, Elverson; Dr. C. J. Bryer, Jr., Gap, and Dr. Philip P. Metzger, Elizabethtown.

The veterinarians departed from the John F. Kennedy International Airport on the first leg of their People-to-People Mission on Sept. 8.

They arrived in Copenhagen the following morning for briefing by representatives of the American Embassy and Danish Ministry of Agriculture.

They have visited Danish veterinary colleges and other training institutes, in addition to meeting with local veterinary authorities.

Other stops on the 21-day agenda include Stockholm, Moscow and Tbilisi in the Soviet Union, Warsaw and Pulawy in Poland, Prague, Munich and Berlin.

The mission, one of the first by American veterinarians, has a double purpose, according to Dr. Samuel F. Scheidy, leader of the group. The delegates will study the methods and working conditions of veterinarians and farmers in the countries visited and will attempt to improve understanding and relations between the United States and the people abroad.

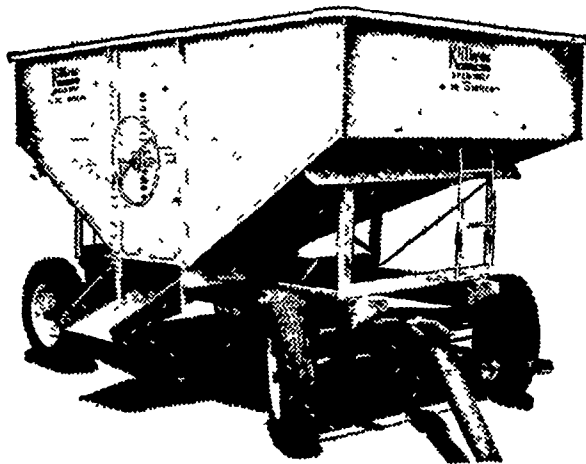

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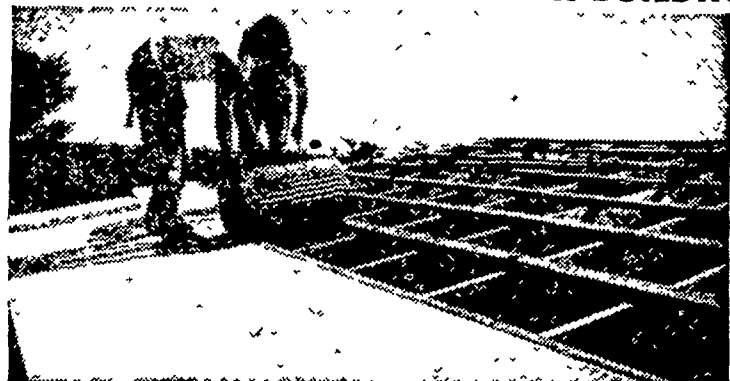
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
