USDA Issues Statement On Stockyard Rules

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has proposed an interpretative statement on regulations and practices of stockyard owners and market agencies under the Packers and Stockyards Act.

The statement sets forth the factors which Consumer and Marketing Service would consider in determining the reasonableness of proposed changes in market regulations, practices, or facilities.

It states that C&MS encourages new regulations, op-

erating practices, and facilities which will make livestock marketing more efficient and competitive, and points out that P&S regulations provide for industry self-regulation—such as the application of by-laws, rules, regulations, or requirements which do not conflict with the P & S Act and its regulations.

According to the statement, the P&S Act does not prohibit changes in the method of trading at a market. A terminal market, for example, may be converted to a public auction market that could

be operated by the stockyard owner, or by the owner in association with some or all of the market agencies which were in business at the terminal market.

Livestock markets do not require federal certification as public utilities to go into business, nor do they need federal approval to discontinue operating.

When a stockyard owner changes his method of operation, services or facilities, reasonable public notice must be given as far in advance as possible.

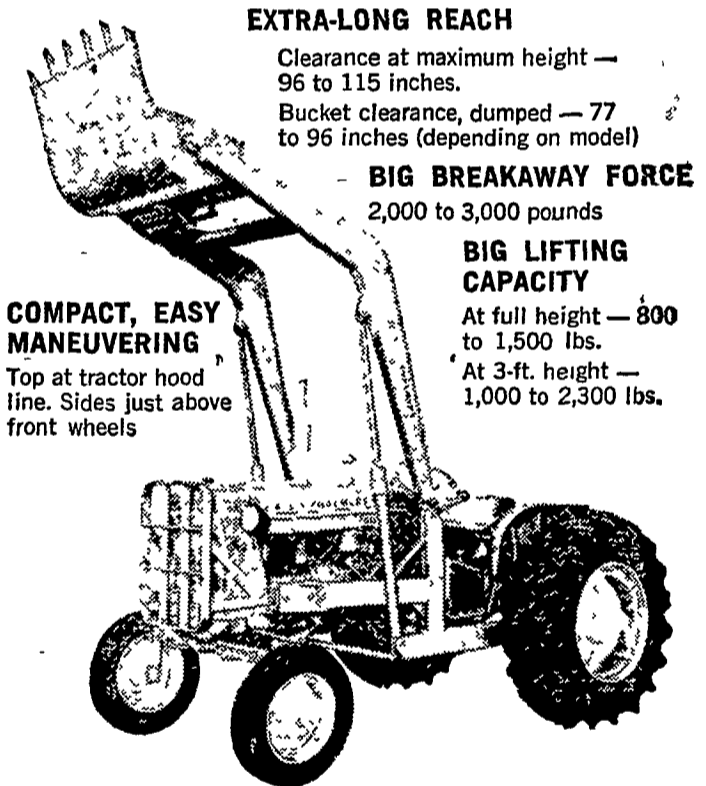
