**Penn State Announces
Two Short Courses**

Dr. Fred C. Snyder, Penn State director of short courses, recently announced two farm business courses will be offered in December.

The first one will be held December 6-8, and will deal with farm income tax and social security problems. It is suggested that farmers, and those who help farmers prepare returns will receive the latest information concerning the income tax law. Other subjects covered will be farm income and expenses, personal deductions, retirement credit tax credit, depreciation, installment sale privilege, and business casualty losses.

On December 9 and 10, a course in wills and estate planning will be offered. Farmers, agricultural businessmen and others who advise and counsel farmers on estate planning are invited to attend.

Registration fees for these courses are \$10 for Pennsylvanians and \$15 for others.

Courses will be held on the main campus and applications or other information can be obtained from Dr. Snyder, Armshy Bldg., Penn State University.

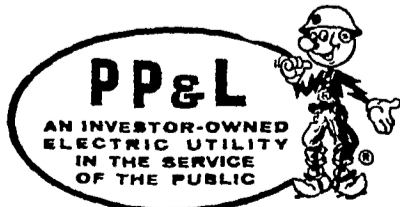
