LIVE HENS

Moderate to heavy offerings of light type hens cleared closely under a good demand. Marketings of older flocks increased sharply to make room for replacements. Heavy type hens moved well as demand improved. Supplies were generally adequate. Increased out-of-state purchases were noted. Prices paid at farms: Light type hens 7-8½ mostly 7½-8c; Heavy type hens 15-15½c.

TURKEYS

Offerings ample. Demand only fair and centered on small lots of hens. Prices paid at farms: Heavy type hens 23-23½c; Toms too few to report.

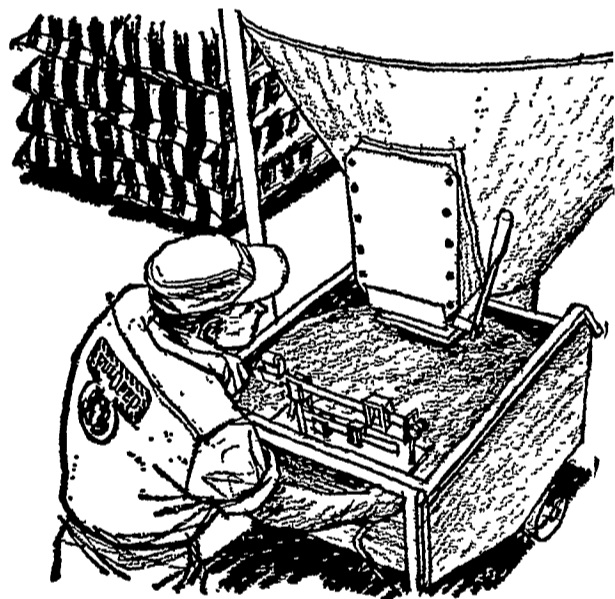

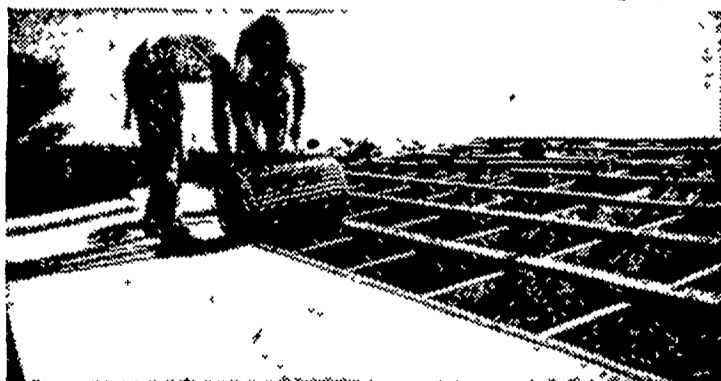
