GRAIN STOCKS Grain stocks in both the state and nation on Octobel 1 were considerably less than the volume in storage a year earlier according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Serv-

ice. In Pennsylvania, wheat, old crop corn, oats, barley and iye totaled 46.7 million bushels down 641.000 bushels or slightly more than 1 percent from a year ago. The nations stock of the same five grains totaled 4.284 million bushels -- 368 million bushels, or about 7 percent less than on October 1, 1964.

Coin and wheat were iesponsible for most of the decline.

The nation's old clop coin cairyover, in both on-farm and off-farm storage amounted to 1,160 million bushels. It was 24 percent less than a year earlier and the smallest October 1 supply since 1955. In Pennsylvania, stocks of old crop coin totaled 5.6 million bushels compared to 45 million bushels a year earlier. Wheat stocks of 1714 million bushels in the U.S were 5 percent less than a year earher In the state, October 1 wheat stocks totaled 142 million bushels, down 4 percent.

TOBACCO

The state's 1965 tobacco crop is estimated at 47.2 million pounds, about 3 percent larger than last year

Yield is expected to average 1,750 pounds per acie, 50 pounds more than in 1964 but 50 pounds below the 1959 -63 average Hot weather and high humidity late in September caused curing problems in some aleas
