Crop Roundup

GRAIN STOCKS

Grain stocks in both the state and nation on October 1 were considerably less than the volume in storage a year earlier according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

In Pennsylvania, wheat, old crop corn, oats, barley and rye totaled 16.7 million bushels down 641,000 bushels or slightly more than 1 percent from a year ago. The nation's stock of the same five grains totaled 1,281 million bushels — 368 million bushels, or about 7 percent less than on October 1, 1964.

Corn and wheat were responsible for most of the decline.

The nation's old crop corn carryover, in both on-farm and off-farm storage amounted to 1,160 million bushels. It was 21 percent less than a year earlier and the smallest October 1 supply since 1955. In Pennsylvania, stocks of old crop corn totaled 5.6 million bushels compared to 4.5 million bushels a year earlier.

Wheat stocks of 1.714 million bushels in the U. S. were 5 percent less than a year earlier. In the state, October 1 wheat stocks totaled 14.2 million bushels, down 4 percent.

TOBACCO

The state's 1965 tobacco crop is estimated at 47.2 million pounds, about 3 percent larger than last year.

Yield is expected to average 1,750 pounds per acre, 50 pounds more than in 1964 but 50 pounds below the 1959-63 average. Hot weather and high humidity late in September caused curing problems in some areas.

RED CLOVER

Red clover seed production in the state is expected to total 650,000 pounds this year, less than half the amount produced in 1964.

Only 10,000 acres were harvested for seed this year, compared to 23,000 last year when production totaled 1,610,000 pounds.
