mostly steady. Cows 50-75 lower and bulls steady in the carlot dressed beef trade, steer and heifer beef steady to 50 lower, cow beef 50-100 lower.

The difference in local receipts from week ago was largely feeder cattle as the supply of slaughter steers and heifers little changed from a week ago. Supply 75-80 percent slaughter steers, around 15 percent heifers, balance cows. Prime made up an estimated 11 percent of the steer run with Choice around 75 percent, balance mostly Good, this little changed from last week and a year ago. 520 steers weighed mostly 900-1350 lbs with the average weight expected to be near last weeks 1136 lb average which was the heaviest in six weeks and compared with 1144 lbs a year ago. For the month of October the average weight of steers was 1125 lbs this the lightest for any month in three years. Heifer supply mostly High Good to High Choice with over 70 percent Choice and the average weight of heifers expected to be the heaviest since April. Early indications are the slaughter under federal inspection this week will be above last weeks 570,000 head and will be the second largest on record.

## Red Meat Production Down For 6th Month In Pennsylvania

Red meat production in the state declined in September, the sixth consecutive month in which output was lower than in the corresponding month of 1964, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

The September total, 84,584,000 pounds, was 5 percent higher than in the previous month, but 4 percent less than in September last year. Pork production was up 3 percent from a year earlier, the only category to show an increase. Beef was down 9 percent; veal down 5 percent, and lamb and mutton down 9 percent.

The last increase in red meat production in Pennsylvania was recorded last March when the total was 13 percent higher than in March 1964. Since the first of the year, meat production in Pennsylvania totaled approximately 6 percent less than in the first nine months last year.

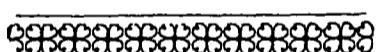
January-September meat production in the United States totaled 22,750 million pounds, 2 percent less than in the corresponding period last year.

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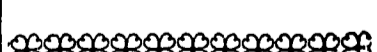
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## Adult Farm Classes To Start At Ephrata H.S.
