All research project proposals submitted must include sequence of achieved goals

complete justification for the project, historical and background data, concise objectives, estimated duration and cost of the project, estimated requirements for personnel and special facilities, source of other contributed funds or resources to the project, identification of cooperating government agencies or industry organizations, and an outline of proposed working plans corresponding to the planned

and objectives.

In developing the justification for the proposal, applicants are urged by Bull to present (1) the importance of the problem to the agricultural economy of Pennsylvania; (2) a statement of the needs which the project will satisfy and the importance of doing the work now; and (3) ways in which public welfare or scientific knowledge will be advanced.

## FHA To Finance Water Systems In Rural Areas

The Farmers Home Administration approved plans to build 119 rural community water systems in 20 states during the first quarter of the fiscal year 1966 and allocat-

ed \$18,402,860 of its lending and loan insurance authority to help finance them, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced this week.

The projects will bring the benefits of modern piped-in water service from a central source to 93,480 rural people who have been depending on wells, streams, ponds and other outdated sources of water in rural communities up to 2,500 population.

In the future, under new legislation recently passed by Congress and signed by the President, the Farmers Home Administration's financial support for rural community facilities development will be available to rural towns up to 5,500 population.

The new legislation now going into effect more than doubles the agency's authority to insure loans for rural community water systems, recreation centers and farm ownership, and extends the authority to include loans for waste disposal systems. Grants augmenting loans also are newly authorized to aid in the development of rural community water and waste disposal systems.

In Pennsylvania a \$40,000 loan to a group of 37 rural families in Glen Hope, Clearfield County, to develop a rural water system, was made on October 20, 1965 by FHA, according to Raymond J. Kerstetter, the agency's state director.

Two and one half years ago the rural residents of Glen Hope attempted to secure sufficient credit to finance the construction of the necessary facilities to meet the water needs of the residents of the community, but were unable to do so.

The community will now have their own system financed by FHA. Kerstetter says The water will be obtained directly from a spring located one mile north of Glen Hope. The non-profit corporation obtained permits from the Pennsylvania State Department of Health and the Power Resources Board to install the water system.

The loan will enable to Glen Hope Water Association, Inc., to construct a reservoir, chlorinator, and lay almost four miles of pipe line. Kerstetter reports that the construction of the water system will mark a milestone in the history of the Clearfield County rural development program. The system will enable families to modernize their homes and will make water available to the schools, business establishments and churches in the area. He states that new homes will be built along the waterline within the coming year. Land values and properties will increase throughout the area served.

Rural water system loans are available to organizations operating on a nonprofit basis such as nonprofit corporations and water supply districts. Small rural towns and other rural political subdivisions are also eligible.

These loans are made only when adequate credit at reasonable rates and terms is not otherwise available.
