Eastern Pennsylvania And New Jersey WEEKLY SUMMARY

LIVE HENS
Prices for light type hens held unchanged. Demand good. Offerings spotty and range fully adequate to barely adequate in Pa. and limited in N.J. Demand for heavy type hens fair. Supplies tending lighter and barely adequate. Undertone stronger. Few sales of 8-9# capons were priced at 32-33c with no grade discounts and 33c subject to quality and grade deductions. Additionally, some 11-12# capons are negotiated to move a consignment selling arrangement. Prices paid @ farm: Light Type hens 7½-9, mostly 8-8¾, Heavy Type Hens 15-16c.

TURKEYS

Prices advanced mostly 1c for hens, unchanged to 1c higher for toms. Demand for heavy type hens continues good; heavy type toms fair. Supplies barely adequate on heavy type hens, short on small type hens and toms, adequate on heavy type toms. Prices paid at farms: Heavy type hens 25-27, mostly 25-26c; toms 21-22.

Eastern Shore Exchange WEEKLY SUMMARY

Broilers and fryers live prices on this week's three-day market at the Eastern Shore Exchange averaged 16.21 cents per lb., down .7-cent from last week's average.

Prices ranged from a high of 17.5 cents per lb. on Monday to a low of 14.6 cents on Wednesday.

Sales for the week totaled 589,800 head, a decline of nearly 400,000 head from the preceding week.

Delmarva broiler and fryer live prices were irregular, declining nearly 1 cent on Wednesday and recovering more than ¼-cent on Thursday. Demand was fair for light auction offerings. Live supplies remained short on heavy sizes.

Ready-to-cook demand ranging slow to fair with only few commitments taken for next week at very competitive prices.

Delivered prices generally trending lower with no plants operating Saturday. Some plants beginning to operate on tom turkeys.

Estimated slaughter for Friday and Saturday, 755,000 head, compared to 873,000 head last weekend.

During the 24 hours preceding market close on Friday, broilers and fryers at farm prices ranged 14.6 to

16.5 cents per lb. on sales of 1,523,900 head.

Early Choice and Prime steers weighing over 1150 lbs later, however, both classes were on the market in reduced numbers and met with broad demand despite the continued massive slaughter under federal inspection and further declines in the dressed beef trade. Almost all buyers were aggressive for numbers to meet slaughtering requirements after Monday, with numerous outside buyers creating a forced atmosphere. Last weeks slaughter under Federal Inspection tied the all time record at 585,000 head. This was the seventh consecutive week in which slaughter has exceeded 500,000 head Ar-

Overall finish of steers was somewhat under the previous week with about 9 percent Prime and 75 percent Choice, compared with 12 percent Prime and 74 percent Choice the previous week and 9 percent Prime and 70 percent Choice a year ago. Average cost of steers was estimated at 26.40 compared with 26.75 last week and 24.51 a year ago. Average weight of steers was estimated at 1142 lbs. the heaviest average since July 1965, compared with 1138 lbs. last week and 1146 lbs a year ago. Heifers were mostly Good to Low Prime weighing 825-1000 lbs.

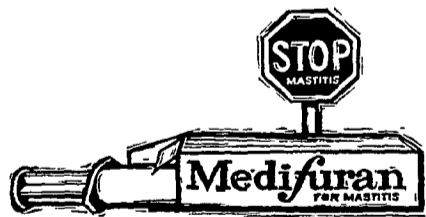
