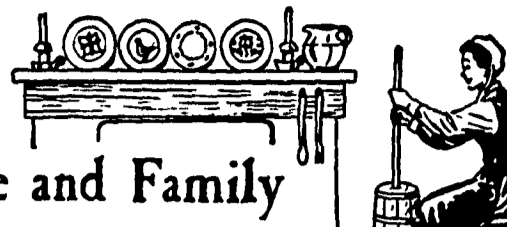

**Ladies, Have You Heard? . . .**

**Be A Good Housekeeper Of Your Camera**

Dust off lens frequently with a lens cleaning tissue. Occasionally, before loading the camera, clean or blow dust off the interior of it. After taking unusual pictures, such as closeups or very fast or slow exposures, always return settings to the average or normal conditions.



**House Needs Checking For Fire Hazards**

Don't put off checking the house for fire hazards. Make periodical checks in attic, basement, closets, and garage to see if they are free of clutter and rubbish. Keep furnace and other heating units in

good repair and see that they are not near combustible walls and ceilings.

Repair or replace frayed electric appliance cords promptly.

See that gasoline and other flammable liquids are stored safely.

Check the escape routes from every room in the house. See that nothing blocks a route so that persons could get out safely in case of an emergency.

Some Facts Worth Knowing About Riboflavin: Riboflavin is one of the B-

complex vitamins. It is soluble in water but is stable to heat. Because of this stability, very little riboflavin is lost in the ordinary cooking process.

Milk and cheese are among the best sources of riboflavin. Heart and liver, lean meat, eggs, and green leafy vegetables contain significant amounts of riboflavin.

Because riboflavin is destroyed when exposed to light, clear glass bottles of milk should not be left where light or sunlight hits them.

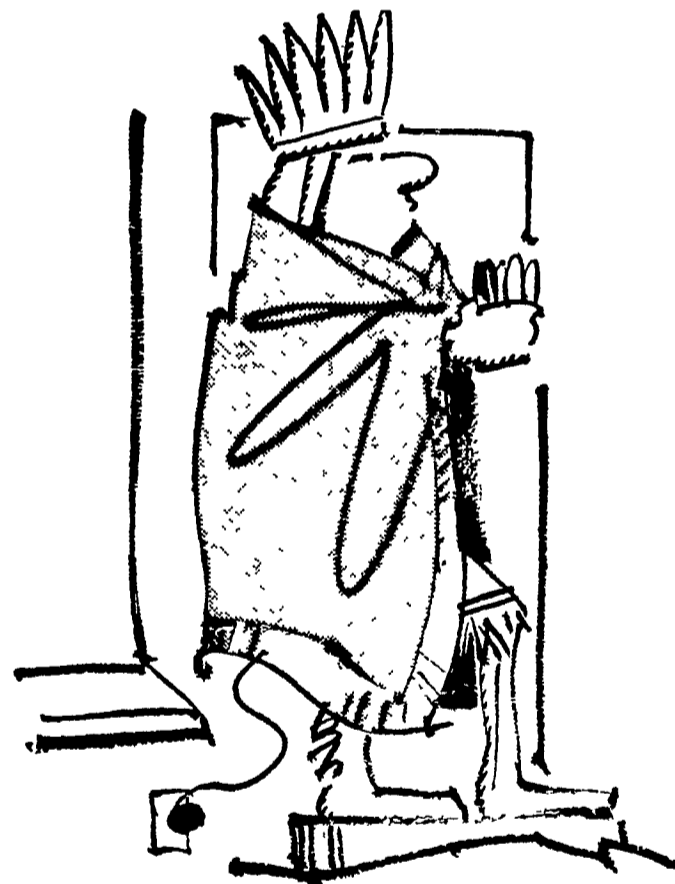
