Hints for Baking Biscuits and Muffins

If you want biscuits with soft, creamy white sides, place the cut pieces of dough close together in pan or on baking sheet. For biscuits with crisper, lightly browned sides, place pieces of dough at least a half to three-quarters of an inch apart.

For tender muffins without tunnels, add liquid and mix the dry ingredients until just moistened. Muffin batter should never be smooth.
