Demand fair on all classes. Offerings barely adequate on hens, fryer/roasters and small breeds, adequate on toms. Prices paid at farms: Heavy Hens, too few to report; Heavy Toms 22¢.

Sales for the week totaled 944,900 head, an increase nearly doubling last week's three-day market.

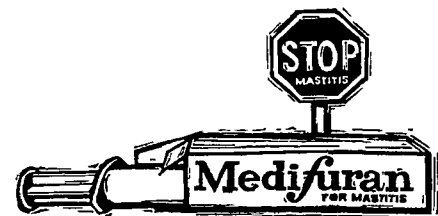
