

Penn Manor FFA Window Exhibit At Farm Show

The prize-winning window exhibit on "Future Farmers Signal Safety" constructed by the Manor Chapter of Future Farmers of America, will be displayed at the Farm Show, and will compete with eight other such FFA displays. The display was built under the direction of Penn Manor High School vocational agriculture teachers Garland Gingerich and Richard Hackenberger.

The nine chapters, chosen from preliminary plans submitted to committees representing areas vocational ag-

riculture supervisors, will compete for the biggest cash awards to be made to the vocational agriculture school division of the Farm Show. The Farm Show Commission is offering \$455 in prizes, top place winning \$75 and other prizes ranging from \$65 down to \$40. The total in prospective awards, however, rises to \$605 because the Pennsylvania Electric Association will offer \$50 and \$25 to the first and second ranked exhibits best displaying farm uses of electricity and the Pennsylvania Association of Soil and Water Conservation District Directors is offering similar prizes for the two exhibits best exemplifying proper use and management of soil and water resources.

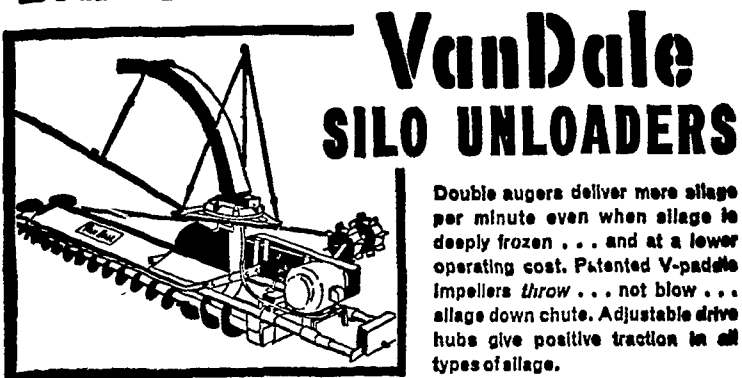

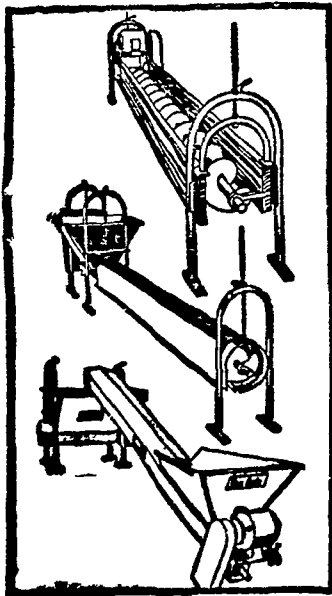
