R. EUGENE RISSER

Eighteen year old Eugene Risser is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert B. Risser, Lititz R1. He is a 1965 graduate of Warwick Union High School, where he studied vocational agriculture for four years.

Gene has been active in local, county, and state FFA activities. He served the Warwick Chapter two years as reporter; performed many committee assignments; and attended FFA Week at Penn State as a dairy judge on two occasions. He has also been active in varsity sports, student body activities, and was in the National Honor Society.

His farming program concentrated on swine feeding and tobacco projects. He is now furthering his education in the College of Agriculture at Penn State University.

FRED E. HESS

Fred is the 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur S. Hess of Leola R1. He is a 1965 graduate of Warwick Union High School. He was recipient of the Outstanding Senior Agricultural Award presented by the Society of Farm Women. During his high school days, he was active in FFA, varsity sports, and student body activities. He has served as president, vice-president, and sentinel of the Warwick FFA Chapter, and as sentinel of the County Chapter.

His farming program has centered around the feeding of swine and he has shown some of his market hogs at the County FFA Swine Show. Field corn was added to his program this past year. Fred is presently employed by Hess Brothers Apple Packaging Co. of Leola, and plans to become established in livestock farming in the future.

DONALD GRUBER

Donald is a 1965 graduate of Elizabethtown High School, and is presently working on his father's farm. He owns two purebred Holstein cows, one of which he won in the Elizabethtown Calf Chain.

He has been active in FFA duties, having served as secretary and as treasurer of his local chapter. He is presently treasurer of the County Chapter.

As part of his farming program, Donald farmed three-quarters of an acre of tobacco, and kept records on his father's dairy herd.

BARRY KURTZ

Barry is a senior at Elizabethtown High School. In his spare time he works on the home farm, and helps in his father's Agway store.

He has served his local FFA chapter as secretary for two years, and has been chairman of planning and scrap drive committees. He also sings in the school chorus, and is active in 4-H work.

Barry owns several purebred Holstein heifers, and also raises a flock of 150 turkeys each year. Last year he and his brother farmed 60 acres, and plan to work another farm this year.

CLIFFORD BOLLINGER

Cliff is a senior at Ephrata High School and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Abram Bollinger of Lititz R4.

He has been very active in FFA duties having served his local chapter as vice-president and president. On the county level, he is currently corresponding secretary, and was voted County Star Farmer for 1965.

He has served as a member of the state FFA dairy judging team, and represented Pennsylvania at Water-

loo, Iowa. At the junior dairy show, he had the junior champion Holstein. He also had the grand champion FFA tobacco entry at the Farm Show.

Cliff's farming program includes six registered Holsteins, six steers, 12 sheep, one acre of tobacco, two acres of corn, and market hogs.

65 market hogs, and includes steers, corn, barley, hay, and capons.

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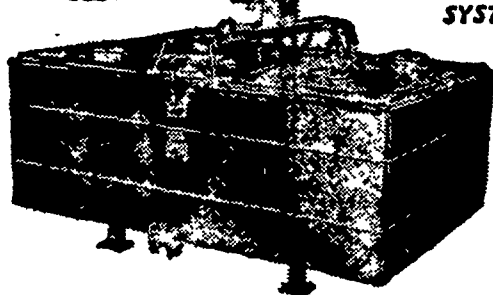
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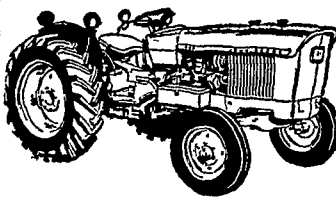
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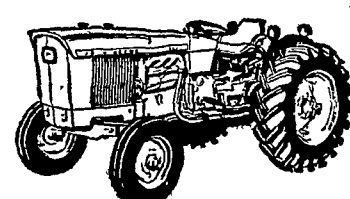


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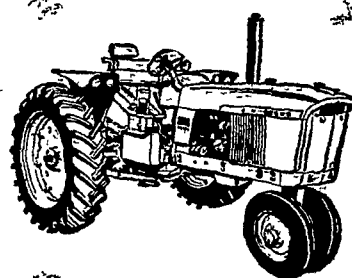
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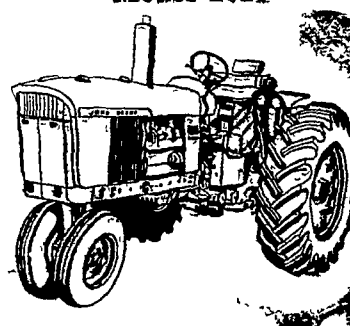
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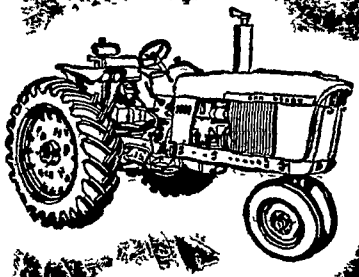
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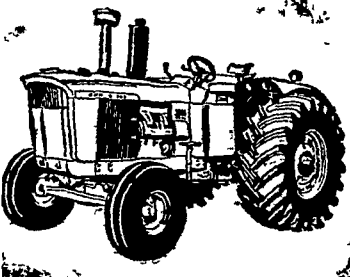
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
