LIVE HENS

Light type hen prices continue unchanged. Demand irregularly fair to good. Offerings barely adequate with increased processing supplies brought in from New England and Virginia. Demand good for scarce offerings of heavy hens. Few area flocks priced at 20-21c. Prices paid at Farms: Light Hens 8-9, mostly 8½c; Heavy Hens, too few sales to report prices.

The course will cover the fundamentals of arc welding in an eight-week session.

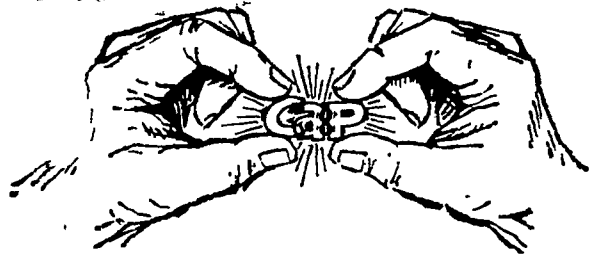
Classes will be held on Monday nights at 7 30 in the agriculture shop, and will be under the direction of Charles Ackley, vocational agriculture teacher.
