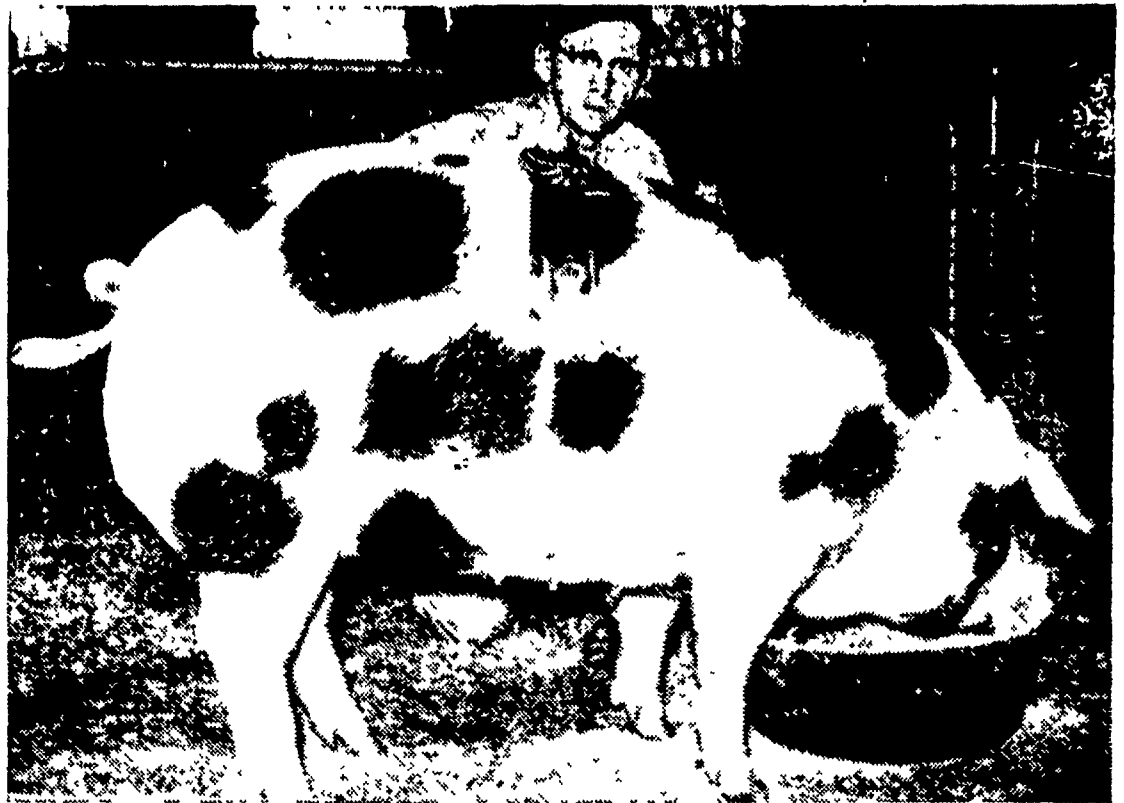

Scott is a well known Butler County farmer, and was associated with his father in the operation of a large dairy farm when he was elected master of the State Grange in October, 1962. He was recently elected secretary of the National Grange, which he served last year as chairman of the Agricultural Committee and gatekeeper.

Scott was recently named by Leland H. Bull, Pennsylvania Secretary of Agriculture, to a committee for administering available research funds. He is also a member of the 1000 Pennsylvanians, Executive Committee of the Pennsylvania State Advisory Council, Steering committee of the Governor's Conference on Natural Beauty and the State Plowing Contest Committee. In addition, he represents the State Grange on the Rural Area Development Board.

Also active in the field of education, Scott is presently serving on the Advisory Council of the State Board of Education and the Advisory Committee for vocational and technical schools. A member of the Education Committee of the Pennsylvania State Chamber of Commerce, he is past-president of the Slippery Rock Area and Butler County School Boards.

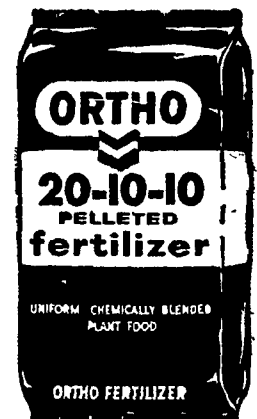
