### Morgan Ram Is Repeat Winner At Farm Show

A yearling ram, Morgan 10, shown by Mrs. Milton K. Morgan of 1916 New Holland Pike, Lancaster, captured his second consecutive Farm Show championship Monday in Suffolk breed competition.

Last year, as a young ram, he led the breed in the Farm Show event, and also finished first in his class at the Pennsylvania Livestock Exposition.

Until last year, the ram title seemed to be the permanent possession of Mrs. Ford Cooper of Jefferson County. Now a new tradition seems to be under way which hopefully will keep the title in Lancaster County.

Mrs. Morgan also showed a young ram which finished second in his class, but for the balance of the classes her entries placed second and third, with one fourth place ribbon in the young ewe class.

#### Crouse Takes Four Ribbons In Hay Show

Galen Crouse, Stevens R1, won Lancaster County's only ribbons in the hay show on Sunday.

Crouse, winner of the Southeastern Pennsylvania hay show championship at Hershey last summer took first-place ribbons in both later cutting alfalfa and summer annual grass categories with heat-cured entries. He also won a second and third place ribbon for his heat-cured grass and field-cured summer annual grass entries, respectively.

The show's top title went to Rolling Rock Farms of Ligonier, Westmoreland County, for its late cutting timothy-and-other-grass exhibit.

Crouse, a dairyman, cures about 40 acres of alfalfa and mixed hay early using a system of ducts in a converted tobacco shed using artificial heat.

### Only Lanc. Beef Breed Entry Is Reserve Champ

HARRISBURG — Thomas C. Daugherty, Kirkwood R1, only Lancaster County with entries in the Hereford Breeding Cattle, Wednesday, at the Pennsylvania Farm Show won the reserve grand champion bull rosette.

Daugherty, who had the Hereford bull champion at the 1961 show, also collected three first place wins and five seconds in judging during the third day of the Farm Show. His prize money totaled \$185.

The reserve grand champion bull, D D Major Colorado 5, a spring bull calf, was born last March 4. The homebred bull was sired by S. F. Colorado 8-81, out of Silver Modesty.

Daugherty, who has been breeding Herefords since 1956, said this was the first time the bull calf was entered in any show.

The calf is out of Full Sister to the entry which was chosen as the 1961 champion. The sire was from Sundown Farms, Gaithersburg, the dam was homebred.

The grand champion bull was an entry by Klips Herefords, of Montgomery County. Klips also had the grand champion female and the reserve grand champion female.

Daugherty won first places in spring bull calf summer yearling heifer, and pair of calves competition.

His second place awards included a two-year-old bull; two bulls bred and owned by exhibitor, spring yearling heifer, junior heifer calf; and get of sire classes.

The judge was M. D. Lacey, of Cornell University, Ithaca, N. Y.

Soleil Farms, Inc., Pottstown R2, piled up seven championships in the Angus division of beef breeding cattle at the State Farm Show.

The Chester County farm won the junior champion bull, reserve junior champion bull, senior champion bull, reserve grand champion bull, senior champion female, and reserve junior champion female, a herdsman for Soleil, had an entry that won the reserve bull calf championship.

Lancaster County did not show in the Angus division because of a hand injury to the owner of the only county entries.

Fred Frey, of Twin Oak Farms, Quarryville R2, suffered a severe right hand injury when a rope attached to a power takeoff looped the hand and slammed Frey against the machinery. He had registered entries for the late junior yearling and senior yearling bull classes.
