

Rutter Bros. Get Gold Star Guernsey Award

WATERBOROUGH, N. H. — Rutter Brothers of York have been named Gold Star Guernsey Breeders for 1965 by The American Guernsey Cattle Club. This is the second straight year that Rutter Brothers have won this honor.

Some of the requirements for the award were that all Guernseys over eight months of age owned by the farm were registered; that the herd included at least 10 registered Guernsey cows with production records made official during the year, with at least 70% of them homebred, that the herd was on official AR or HIR-DHIR test with a lactation average at least 15% over the breed average for either milk or butterfat, 305-2X ME, and that 80% of the cows, with official record, completed during the year were classified with an average score for the group of 84.5% or better.

The production summary of Rutter Brothers herd showed 65 cows with 75 records averaging 11,671 pounds of milk and 592 pounds of fat 305-2X ME and with an average classification for 64 cows of 84.8 percent.

To win a Gold Star Guernsey Breeder Award a herd must also meet rigid health requirements and an applicant for the award must be an active member of both a State Guernsey Association and The American Guernsey Cattle Club.

(Continued from Page 13) an informative talk on turkey farm sanitation practices in general, and how to disinfect pole barn dirt floors in particular. Goldhaft told his audience that 20 parts of ammonia per million parts of air — which the average human cannot detect — is sufficient to significantly increase respiratory ailments in chickens or turkeys. Wide open turkey houses help solve this problem, he said, but frequently create others.

For treating dirt floors, Goldhaft recommended the use of liquid formaldehyde, diluted one to one with water, and injected into an ordinary garden hose using a liquid proportioner at the rate of one ounce of the formaldehyde-water concentrate to a gallon of water. The solution is an irritant to humans and is best applied with the type of lawn sprinkler that travels by coiling up its own hose. After application, the house should be fully ventilated for at least two weeks to allow the fumes to dissipate.

John T. Macdonald of the American Plywood Association and William J. Roberts, Rutgers Agricultural Engineer, both of whom used slides and other visual aids to show the latest construction techniques for pole barns and other types of turkey housing. From an engineering standpoint, Roberts said, houses should either be wide open or completely enclosed. A house with one side closed creates air pressures in stormy weather that can easily raise the roof.

A lively panel discussion concluded the program of some of the major management health problems facing turkey growers. John Bezpa, Rutgers' Extension poultry specialist, moderated the session. Seiving on the panel were, all of the Conference speakers plus Harry Wentz, Haileysville; H. Earl Gingrich of York and Austin Risse of Sparta, N. J.
