## Eastern Pennsylvania And New Jersey WEEKLY SUMMARY

### LIVE HENS

Prices on light hens unchanged to 1/4c higher. Offerings short. Some buyers discontinued bidding until after Easter when increased offerings are expected. Demand on heavy hens fair for adequate offerings. Some inquiries for 5-6# hens unfilled as occasional processors were unable to secure requirements from New England sources. Few 10-11# capons on a run basis were noted at 38c. Prices paid at total: Light hens 9-10 1/4c, mostly 10-10 3/4c, heavy 21-22c, mostly 22c.

### TURKEYS

Supplies on heavy hens & toms short. Offerings of light ample. Demand fair on both classes. Few farm sales of 10-12# toms at 27c & 8-10# hens @ 36c noted to kosher outlets.

## Eastern Shore Exchange WEEKLY SUMMARY

Broiler and fryer live prices on the Eastern Shore Exchange this week averaged 18 7/8 cents per lb., practically unchanged from last week's average.

Prices paid during the week ranged from a high of 20 2/3 cents on Monday to a low of 17 9/16 cents, on Thursday.

Sales at 1,369,600 head were about 100,000 head less than last week's sales.

### Delmarva

March 25, 1966

Delmarva broiler and fryer live prices declined nearly 1/4-cent today, with only fair demand for moderate auction offerings. Live supplies were adequate for needs.

Ready-to-cook demand was spotty and competitive.

Estimated slaughter for Friday and Saturday, 897,000 head, compared to 785,000 head last weekend.

In the 24 hours preceding market close today, prices paid at farms and reported purchases were 179 to 200 cents per lb on purchases of 15 million head.

Because it contains traces of the pesticide, don't save or reuse any pesticide container. Puncture or break empty metal or glass containers to prevent possible reuse. But if the pesticide is in an aerosol can, never puncture or burn the can. Put the can intact in the trash.

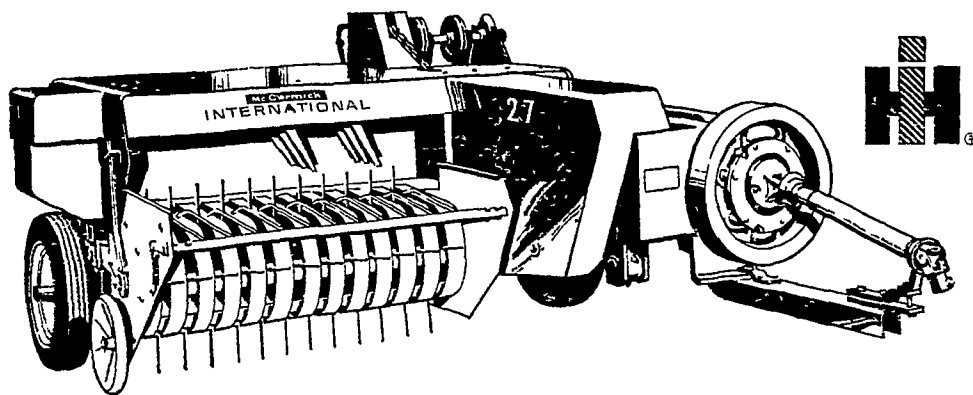

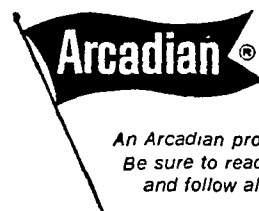
