(Continued from Page 1) though U.S. farmers grossed \$43 billion in 1965, they spent \$32 billion on expenses other than the needs of their own families," the official told the local association members.

People should not look down on politics, Empie said. He described politics as the art of self-government, and said that it fails to work only when those doing the self-governing fail to do their jobs.

"The only thing necessary for evil to prevail," Empie quoted, "is for good people to do nothing. What are you people doing to prevent evil in government?" he challenged.

In discussing the government's agricultural policies, Empie said, "we need a secretary of agriculture in Washington who knows farming and who will represent farmers, not consumers".

"Keep your eyes and ears open and learn what's going on, then get out and work for representatives who will preserve the America we want," Empie concluded.

These studies, now completed, will be reported at the 1966 conference as recommendations to the Governor.

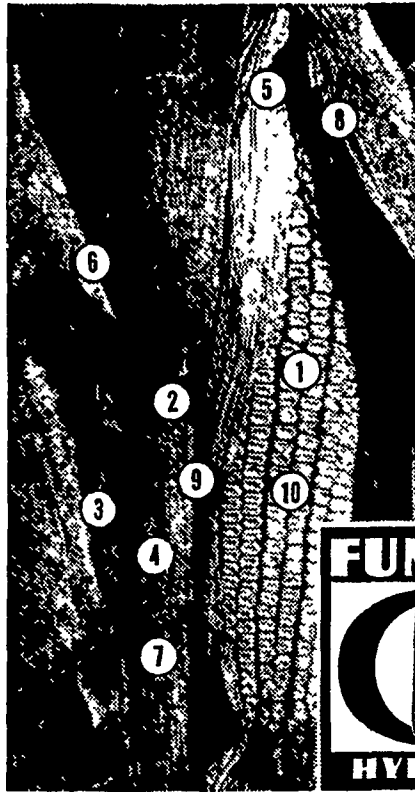
The reports will be presented by chairmen of six sub-committees, each of which examined a particular facet of the total farm program.

Secretary Bull and Jack R. Grey, Deputy Secretary of Agriculture, head a committee on arrangements.

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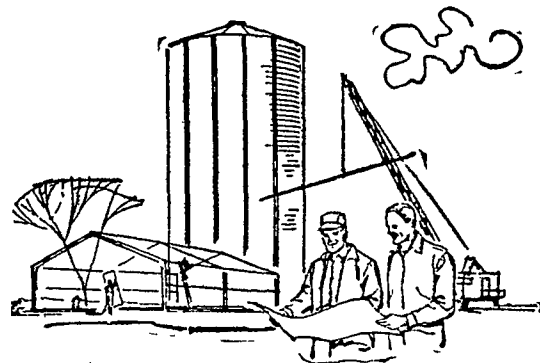
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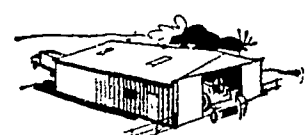
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
