

Agr. Advisers For Vietnam To Be Recruited

The U. S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the Agricultural Extension Services of the land grant universities is recruiting a corps of 40 to 50 agricultural advisers to help increase food production in secured provinces of South Vietnam. Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced this week.

The corps will be composed of young county agents and other professional workers in related agricultural activities the Secretary said. The workers are being recruited through the Federal Extension Service.

These men, well-trained in the practical side of farming and in working with rural people, will help in the

peaceful restoration of Vietnamese land to full production," Freeman added. He explained that about 75 percent of that country's population consists of farm people. "They need and welcome the types of technical assistance the United States can provide, as well as fertilizer, seeds, and other farm supplies."

Applicants will be screened and selected within the next month. Then they will be given 6 months of intensive training in the language, culture, and tropical agriculture of South Vietnam.

Later they will be assigned to the secured Vietnamese provinces and will devote at least 18 months to working alongside Vietnam leaders in rebuilding their agriculture.

This program is being conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the Agency for International Development.

Witmers Win Gold Star Award For 4th Year

The poultry studies are among twenty different farm research projects that have been started by the Department of Agriculture as part of

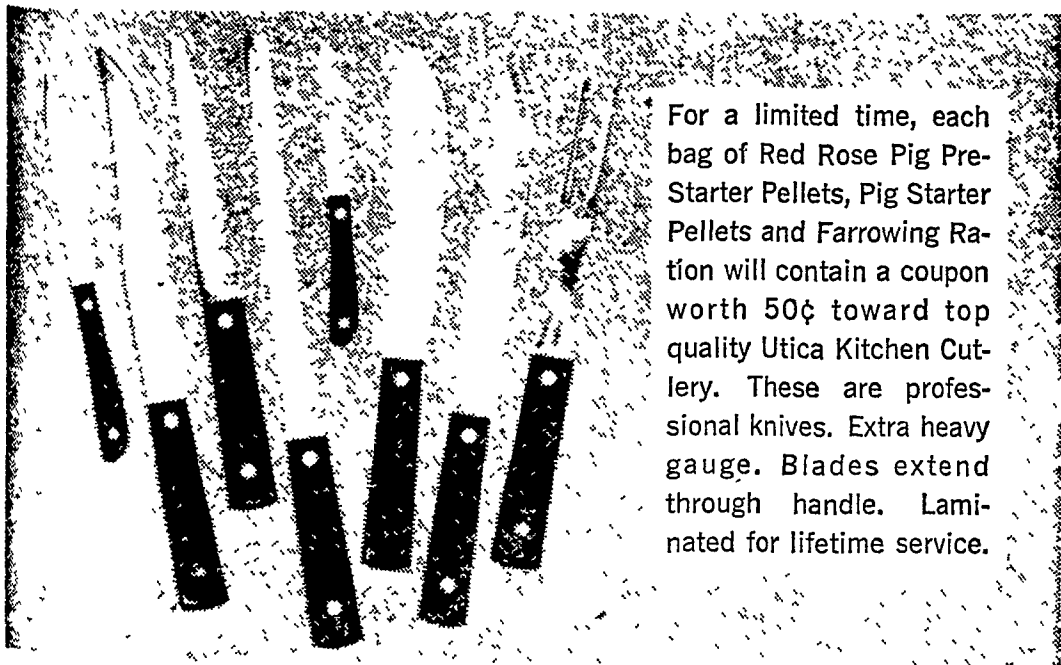
