Lancaster Horse Show Set For May 20-22

The annual Lancaster Horse Show, scheduled for May 20, 21 and 22, will be held at the Lancaster County Riding and Tennis Club grounds, Lincoln Highway West, Lancaster, according to show co-chairmen Miss Peggy Steinman, Robert Brandt, and Chris McMurtrie.

Divisions scheduled this year include saddle horse; roadster, Tennessee Walking horse, western pleasure horse; quarter horse, hunter; jumper, junior exhibitor, saddle seat equitation, and the NCHA championship cutting horse contest.

Two members of the Flying Dutchman Parachute Club will sky-dive from an altitude of 12,000 feet. They will open their chutes at 2,500 feet and land in one show ring. A baking contest and games for the children will also be featured.
