Lot average broiler and fryer prices on the Eastern Shore Exchange for this 3-day week (Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday) declined nearly 1 cent, to average 16.07 cents per lb.

The range of prices paid ran from 15.2 cents on Tuesday to a high of 17.2 cents per lb. on Wednesday.

Sales for the week totaled 1,255,500 head, despite the 3-day week. This was down from last week's total by approximately 1.3 million head.

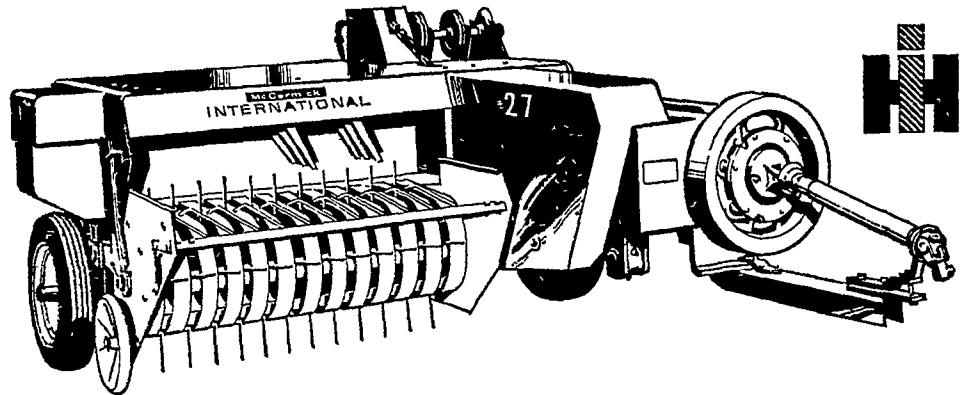

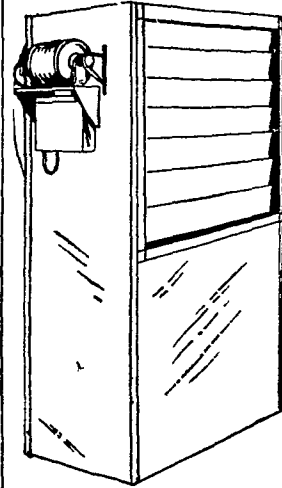
