The next board meeting will be held August 2 at Long's Park in Pavilion No 2. The picnic committee will be in charge.

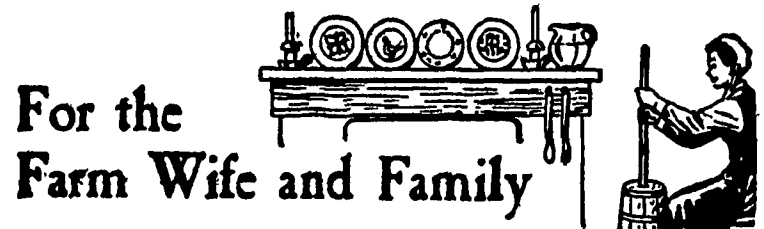

The most inexpensive dress can be made to look better if it fits, if excess trimmings are removed, and if you use the right accessories.

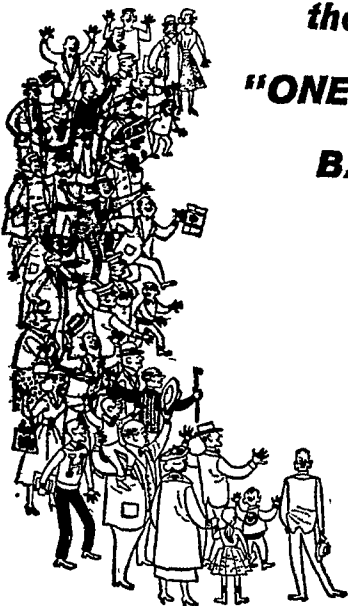
Don't make the mistake of wearing something that attracts more attention to what you're wearing than to who is wearing it. Clothes should be an integrated part of you so will come out easily.
