Cycle #1

(From housing until 4 weeks after peak production.) The critical stage, the bird is still growing and producing eggs at the same time. Stress is heavy. The bird needs a high protein, heavily fortified ration — USE HORNCO NO. 101 LAYER RATION A-1.

Cycle #2

(From 4 weeks after peak production and as long as the birds are laying 65% or more.) During this period a high energy, medium protein ration is needed to assure steady production, low feed conversions. If this type ration is not provided, body weight will slip and results will suffer. USE HORNCO NO. 102 LAYER RATION B-2.

Cycle #3

(When production is below 65%.) This is the period when the need for energy, protein and other nutrients decreases, due to less activity of the egg making organism. The correct ration is needed during this period to prevent excessive fat accumulation and to help the bird produce up to her bred-in potential — USE HORNCO NO. 103 LAYER RATION C-3.

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
