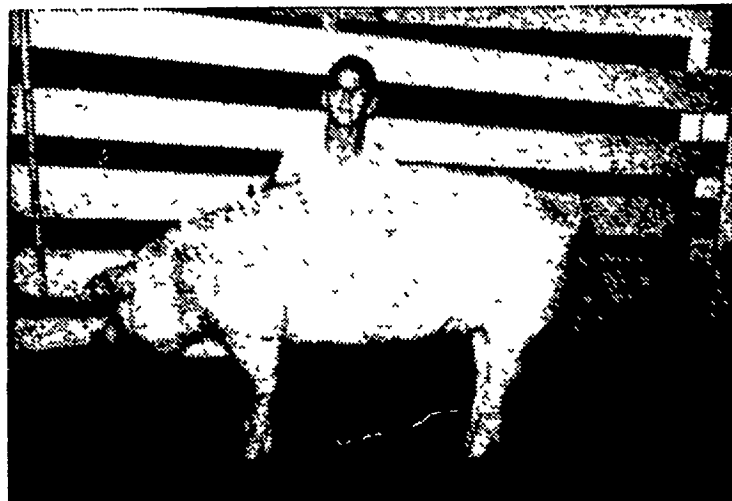

cents a pound. The reserve grand champion lightweight Spotted Poland China gilt was bought by Walter M. Dunlap & Sons, Inc., Lancaster, at 35 cents a pound. Both of these figures were considerably stronger than last year's prices paid for grand and reserve champion 4-H pigs, which were 43 and 27 cents, respectively. This year's average sale price on the 146 head offered was also slightly higher at \$27.27 per

hundredweight, compared to last year's \$26.08 average. Pigs this year at 215 pounds averaged six pounds heavier than last year's entries. The sale is annually sponsored by the Lancaster Livestock Exchange.

In the junior and senior showmanship classes, winners were Donald Bollinger, Denver R2, and Thomas Lefever, Quarryville R1, respectively. This was the second consecutive year's win in that division for Bollinger. Reserve showman ribbons went to Marlin Bollinger, Denver R2, junior;

The champion Pen of Ten were Spotted Poland Chinas shown by David Leininger, Denver R2. Reserve honors went to a pen of Berks exhibited by Robert Groff, Peach Bottom. Groff's Berkshires took the top spot at last year's Pen of Ten event.

Part way in the program, associate county agent Victor Plastow stopped the activities to announce that this year's 4-H Pig Show was being dedicated to the memory of Arlie Anderson, long-time swine herdsman at Masonic Homes Farm and friend of young 4-H showmen. Anderson passed away since the last show, Plastow said, and he is missed by many. Plastow introduced James Horton, swine herds-

man, and Carlton Schuldt, superintendent, of Masonic Homes Farm. Schuldt said he had been associated with Arlie Anderson since 1944, when he brought him to Masonic Homes Farm. "He furnished a lot of boys and girls with 4-H pigs," Schuldt said, "and traveled widely showing and judging hogs." He quoted Anderson's saying that of all the hogs he'd spent time with 'none of them had ever lied to him.'

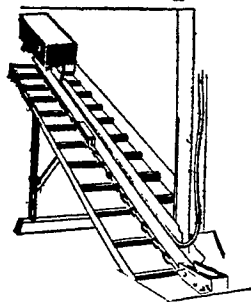
