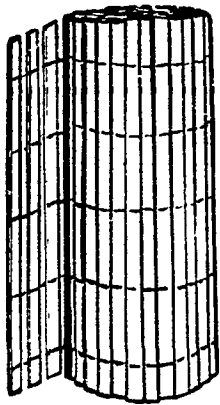

The vacation-bound car is "loaded" — with luggage and more passengers than usual — adding to the driver's distractions.



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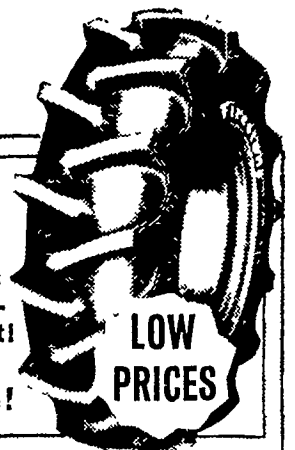
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
