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the total of pledges and gifts to \$300,027.

Meanwhile, the architectural drawings and specifications were completed by the architectural firm of Hank and Kaufman and issued to leading contractors in the area. In case funds would not be available to build the entire center, bids were requested on both the entire Farm and Home Center and separately for the central office building and for the large multi-purpose area for meetings, workshops and educational sessions.

These bids were opened September 15 and it became evident that building costs had advanced almost exactly as architect, S. Dale Kaufman of Strasburg, had estimated. Low bids indicated that:

Cost of the entire Farm and Home Center would be about \$485,000;

Cost of the central office unit only would be about \$300,000.

Bids must be accepted or rejected by October 15, 1966.

Sufficient funds are available to build the office unit only, but Board Members were not

willing to undertake the debt involved to build the entire unit with funds now on hand, Herr said. However, realizing the great value of the multi-purpose unit to farmers, youth groups, women's organizations and the community, it was resolved to make an urgent effort to raise additional funds now, so that the entire Farm and Home Center can be built all at once.

With this in mind, our anonymous benefactor was contacted again; and, because of his genuine interest, responded most fully by agreeing to provide an additional challenge pledge of \$25,000 to be matched by pledges and contributions from interested persons.

This added \$50,000, plus additional funds that could be secured by continued efforts while construction proceeded, would bring the mortgage balance down to an acceptable amount. The Board voted at its September 20 meeting to:

Accept this challenge pledge with thanks and gratitude; match it as quickly as possible; proceed with building the entire Farm and Home Center—

provided the \$25,000 challenge pledge is matched without delay.

Suitable mortgage financing can be arranged for the balance required, Herr stated.

Letters requesting additional pledges to match the challenge pledge are going out this week to all contributors. Also a short, intensive "Double-Duty Dollars" campaign is being staged by Farm and Home Foundation Board members under leadership of the Campaign Co-Chairmen, Levi Brubaker, farmer residing near Rohrerstown; and Larry Skromme, New Holland Machine Co. vice president. The Farm and Home Foundation Board of Directors will meet again on October 6 to review progress and decide if bids should be let to build the entire Farm and Home Center, Herr concluded.
