County ACP Funds Reduced For 1967

Funds allocated to Lancaster County for the 1967 Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) were reduced \$2000 from last year's \$112,000 allocation, Miss Dorothy Y. Neel, manager of the county Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation office, said this week.

She added that the state allocation of \$4,620,000 had been reduced by \$35,000 from last year's total

The cost-share conservation practices on which ACP assistance will be available in Lancaster County will be announced following a program development meeting on October 19, Miss Neal stated The committee developing the local program consists of representatives of the County Extension Service, Farmers Home Administration, Soil Conservation Service, State Forester, Soil & Water Conservation District directors, and ASCS. -

Nationally, the amount distrubuted was the same as last year-\$209,750:000, and will be spread among more than a million farmers in establishing or improving a variety of conservation measures on their farms
