Prices on light hens unchanged. Offerings ample. Demand fair to good with labor shortages hindering movement. Offerings of heavy hens fully adequate. Demand light with a weaker undertone prevailing. Prices paid at farm: Light Hens 7-9, mostly 8-8½; Heavy Hens, too few to report.

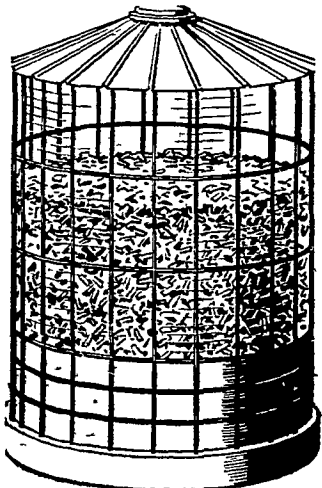

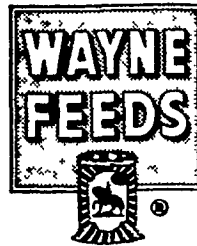
