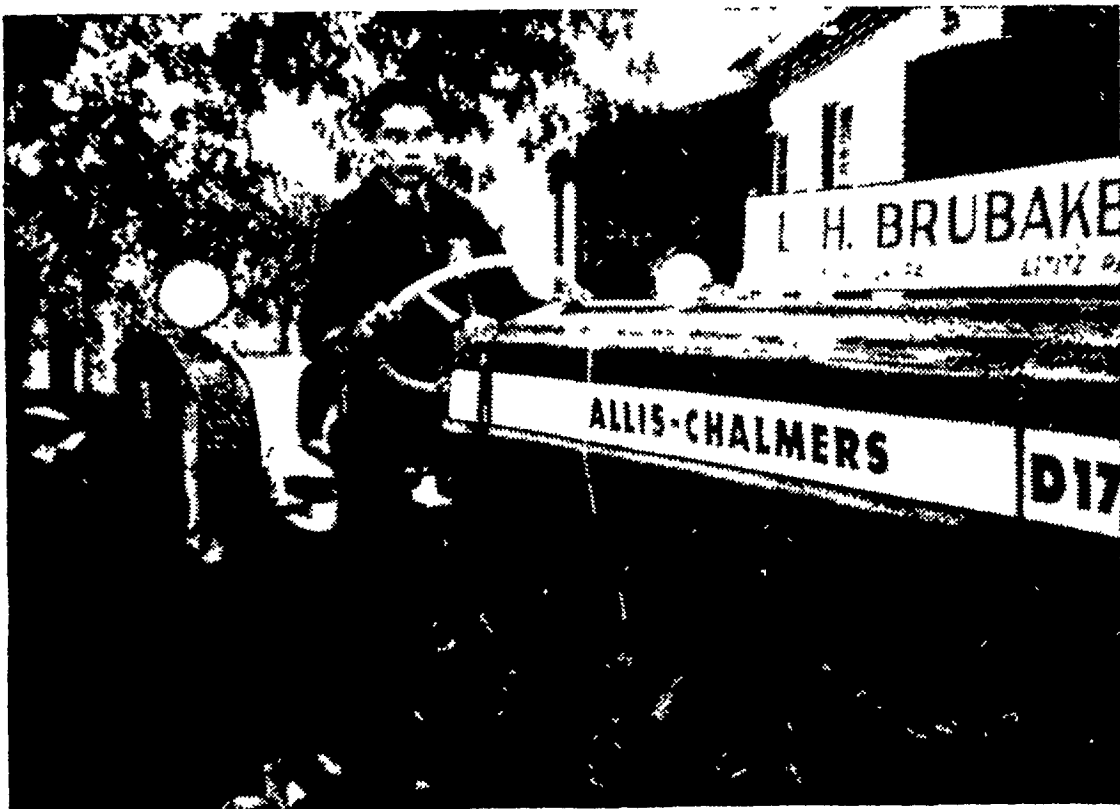

The occasion was the first annual FFA baby beef sale held last Friday night in conjunction with the Manheim Farm Show. The reserve champion, a 940-pound Charolais shown by Jay Hess of Mount Joy R2, was bought by Jake Geib at \$31.50 per hundredweight.

The average price for the 12 head sold was \$29.46 per hundredweight.

(Continued from Page 1) held next month at Lewis-town, would be a good place to start "advertising" the '67 convention, and after some discussion, it was agreed that a packet of literature would be distributed at that time. The packet will contain information on the Host Farm Motel, local tours, and a general outline of the proposed 1967 program. County SCS conservationist Orval Bass briefly outlined the need for holding more watershed meetings in the county. He presented a map of the county, by townships, showing the locations of the district's strengths and weaknesses, and suggested holding meetings in the areas where fewest co-operators were represented. Bass noted that vocational agriculture teachers have offered to cooperate in spreading the conservation story in each of these areas. Watershed meeting dates were set for Churchtown, November 8; Colerain Township, November 16; and Elizabethtown, November 29. Committees were set up for each of the area meetings.

County Farmers Cited By State
