Milk production in Pennsylvania in September totaled 527 million pounds, approximately two percent less than in Sertember 1965, according to the State Clop Reporting service

Production per cow averaged 740 pounds for the month, highest for any September on record, and up 20 pounds from September a year ago

The number of milk cows in the state in September was estimated at 742,000, down 2,000 from the previous month and 37,000 from September 1965
