CHESTER COUNTY 4-H STAMP PROJECTS SHOWN

Members of the Chester County 4-H Pioneer Philatelists (stamp collecting) Club displayed their stamp albums at the Kimberton Fire Hall, Wednesday evening, October 19. In addition to their collections, the members also exhibited their 4-H record books which included definitions of stamp terms, records of expenses, written histories of selected stamp series and a record of all US stamps issued during the current year.

The champion exhibit was displayed by Greta Wenger, Phoenixville, a third-year member in the club. Her brother, Lloyd, tied with Theresa Krull, Lanfield, for reserve champion display. Winning displays in the second and first year divisions were exhibited by Vickie and Linda Krull, respectively, both of Lanfield.

Mr. L. W. Shaner and Miss Dawn Shaner, both of Spring City, judged the members' displays.

Mrs. Horace Wilson, Kimberton, and Miss Nicholas Krull, Lanfield, are Leaders of the 4-H club.

Ivanhoe Dau. Brings \$2100 At N.H. Show-Sale

The annual Dairy Cow Show and Sale held at New Holland Sales Stables Wednesday, drew a crowd estimated at 1,500.

The top sale animal, a five-year-old daughter of Osbornedale Ivanhoe, was sold for \$2,100 to Edwin Frey of Fair Hill Farms, Chestertown, Md. Exhibitors of the Holstein were Marvin A. Eshleman, Strasburg, and H. D. Matz, Schaefferstown. The entry's record is 17,610 pounds of milk and 686 pounds of butterfat.

According to manager John Gingrich there were 289 head shown at the event, with participation from Canada, Wisconsin, Maryland, Delaware, New York and Pennsylvania. Gingrich said most of the entries were Holsteins, with some Guernseys and Ayrshires.

The judge was Dr. John L. McKittrich, of Dublin, Ohio, a nationally recognized cattle judge.

The second highest priced animal, a four-year-old Holstein, sold for \$2,000 to Robert Marcum of Maryland. The exhibitor was Melvin Kolb, of Lancaster.

Frey also bought another Osbornedale Ivanhoe daughter for \$1,800, and her two-day-old calf for \$300.

A three-year-old grade Holstein shown by Eshleman was sold for \$1,100 to Charles C. Myers, operator of the Black and White Farm, Lancaster.

Gingrich reported the eight highest animals averaged \$1,490, the 27 highest, \$975, and 81 head sold at \$500 or more averaged \$693.

CONTROL RODENTS

To keep rodents out-of-doors during the winter, rat-proof farm buildings with concrete, galvanized sheet metal, brick, brick hardware cloth and aluminum, suggests Stanley G. Gesell, extension entomologist at Penn State University. New construction should be equipped with concrete floors and sufficiently deep rat-proof walls.

CHICKS NEED CARE

Good housing and ample floor space are necessary for poultrymen to be successful with fall and winter chicks, say extension poultry specialists at Penn State University. Poultry buildings should be draft and vermin free, with adequate ventilation.

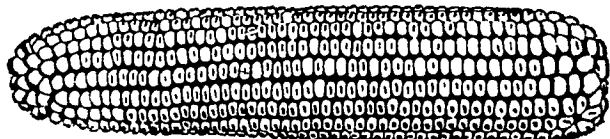
