## Milk Hearings Set For 71 Fed. Market Orders

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced this week that it will hold area-wide hearings to consider the appropriate level of fluid milk (Class I) prices to be set beginning December 1966 for all 71 federal milk marketing orders.

The hearings will be held at four different locations during the week of Nov. 14. Times and places of the hearings will be announced later, USDA said.

Consumer and Marketing Service officials said the hearings were requested by representatives of dairy farmers who said anticipated reductions in prices under current provisions of the marketing orders threaten to reduce the supply of milk in their areas below the level needed to supply consumers.

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## County Poultrymen Urged To Support State & Local Assns.; Elect 4 Directors

In the past 30 years membership in the Pennsylvania Poultry Federation has dropped from 8000 to 566. Walter Wheelock, vice president of the state federation, told nearly 300 poultrymen, wives, and allied industry men at the county association's annual banquet meeting Thursday night at the Plain & Fancy Farm Restaurant that this was a dangerous situation for the Pennsylvania poultry industry.

"Since poultrymen, in particular, and farmers, in general, represent only about six percent of the population today it is important that your state and local associations have large percentage memberships if they are to truly represent the poultry industry," Wheelock said. He urged the county poultrymen to support the poultry federation so that the federation could speak for a majority of the state's poultrymen.

Wheelock noted that the chairman of the membership committee was a Lancaster Countyman, Robert D. Hill, Jr. 1918 Lititz Pike.
