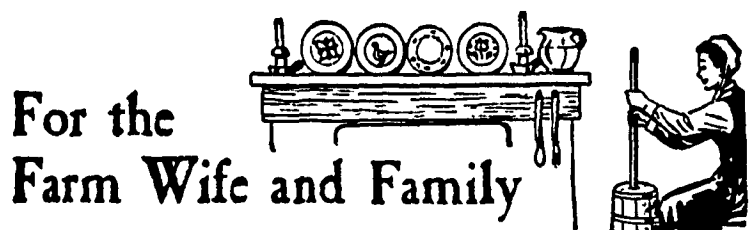

Ladies, Have You Heard? . . .

When You Buy Your Holiday Turkey
If you're selecting your turkey more than three days in advance of the day you'll serve it, better buy a frozen one.

Choose the frozen turkey that has an undamaged wrapper. Exposure to air dries out the meat and encourages a rancid off-flavor to develop.

You can safely buy fresh turkey two or three days in advance. Select a turkey with clean waxy skin, without bruises or discolorations, few pinfeathers, and a well-distributed layer of fat.

For a mouth-watering bird, choose a meaty turkey, with broad breast and short, thick legs and thighs.

When you buy a ready-to-cook turkey weighing twelve pounds or less, allow one pound of meat for each serving.

When you buy medium or heavy ready-to-cook birds weighing twelve pounds and over, figure on two servings from each pound of turkey.

Communicate With Businessmen

Your spending choices tell businessmen what you want. Tell salespeople what you like and dislike about products and services.

Let businessmen know, through letters and calls, when you approve or disapprove of their operating policies, their services, or the products they sell.

Tell your friends when you have good results with a particular product or store. "Word

of mouth" is one of the most powerful forms of advertising.

When you have a problem, be ready with the facts. Have a description of the item, service or incident being reported, date of purchase, department, and the name or number of the salesperson, your sales check, and any label, seal, warranty, or guaranty that came with the purchase.

Usually it's preferable to discuss your problem in person or in a letter rather than by telephone. If you fail to get satisfaction from the retailer, contact the manufacturer directly. If you have serious trouble with a business firm, contact the local Chamber of Commerce or Better Business Bureau. They are concerned with fair practices in business and they usually get effective results.
