**Sec. Bull Sees Further Growth For Farm Show**

**HARRISBURG** — Supporting organizations that comprise the State Farm Show Committee has increased to sixty, a new high number, with the addition of the American Mushroom Institute, State Agriculture Secretary Leland H. Bull said this week.

The committee, of which Bull is chairman, gave unanimous approval at its fall meeting to an application from the mushroom growers.

This marked the second expansion of the committee since last January's Golden Anniversary Farm Show, the Pennsylvania Rural Electric Association having been elected to membership at the committee's spring meeting.

Secretary Bull said the committee serves in advisory capacity to the Department of Agriculture in developing plans

for the Farm Show, and that all member organizations will be active in the 51st show next January 9 to 13.

Preparations for the 1967 Farm Show, he said, already are well advanced under the guidance of Horace L. Mann, director. Next January's show is being developed, Bull stated, on the general pattern of the record-breaking 1966 event that had more than 11,000 entries on display in twenty-seven departments. Attendance reached a new high estimate of 700,000.

Secretary Bull said the Farm Show has "a potential for further growth," as indicated by a professional management consultant study, and that new gains will be possible with improvement and enlargement of the physical plant in accordance with recommendations in that report.
