**Milk Hearings To Reconvene**

**On Handler Pool** — Inter-State Milk Producers' Cooperative will again vigorously contest a proposal to change the Philadelphia milkshed's traditional handler pool system to a marketwide pool, a co-op spokesman said this week (Nov. 9). The federal-state joint hearing to revise Order 61 reopens in Philadelphia on Tuesday (Nov. 13).

The market pool proposal has been made by I. Elkin Nathans, a New York milk broker, and is supported by a large New York federation of producers, and by two large Philadelphia producers.

Inter-State contends that adoption of a market pool system would lower the blend price to area producers, and would probably increase the milk price to consumers. The hearing, which has been in session during the summer, was recessed on August 22.

**Guernsey Men Elect Stoltzfus** — Melvin R. Stoltzfus, Ronks R1, was elected president of the Lancaster County Guernsey Breeders Association Friday night (Nov. 23) at a director's meeting at the home of Raymond Rohrer, Lancaster R7. He succeeds Raymond F. Witmer, Willow Street R1.
