**OWNER-SAMPLER ELIGIBILITY**

The question of voting eligibility of owner-sampler members was discussed, but the directors were informed by association adviser Victor Plastow that their eligibility could only be accomplished by a change in the by-laws. Head tester Wilbur Houser informed the board that there were pre-

sently 325 DHIA herds and 300 owner-sampler herds under the testing program.

The southeastern Pennsylvania District DHIA directors' meeting will be hosted by Lancaster County this year, Plastow told the board. This all-day conference will be held in March, and will involve about 60 persons. The president appointed directors Melvin Groff and Raymond Hoover to find a place to hold the district meeting.

Plastow announced that four association testers would be eligible for plaques to be awarded at the district conference, and Breneman appointed I. Eby Hostetter as committee chairman to work up applications for the award by December 16.

At the last testers' meeting, Wilbur Houser stated, the supervisors had suggested making the association annual report available to owner-sampler herds free of charge. Houser also reported he had secured three bids for printing the report.

The board voted to leave selection of a printer to Houser, and decided to have enough copies of the report printed to distribute copies to owner-sampler members.

Houser reported that a test-er in the eastern end of the county, Larry Twigg, had resigned, and that his replacement was Clifford Bender. The effective date of the personnel change was November 10, Houser said.

**MORE MILKING PARLORS**

In other business, Houser told the board that the steady increase in numbers of milking parlors in the area had created greater demand for use of the association's milk-o-meter equipment. At an earlier meeting, directors had voted to hold off adding more milk-o-meters in anticipation of an improved metering device appearing on the market. But so far, Houser stated, the National Dairy Herd Improvement Association

has not given the new equipment its official approval.

The board voted to approve purchase of a new adding machine for \$88 for use by association treasurer Jacob Houser.

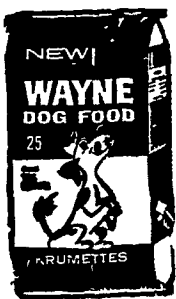
