Prices on light hens held unchanged. Demand good in New Jersey, light in Penna., especially where some quarters were inactive due to time off for deer hunting. Offerings fully adequate. Trading on heavy hens very light with most movement based on prior commitments. Prices paid at farm: Light Hens 6-7, mostly 6½-7c; Heavy Hens too few to report.

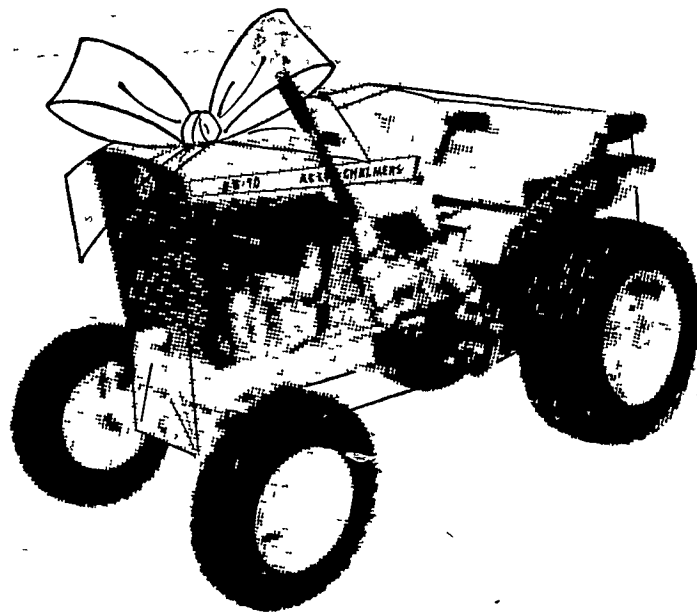
