

Milk Prices

Denver, Washington, D. C., Minneapolis, Minn., and Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., at the request of dairy farmer representatives.

This action, for most federal order markets where prices depend on the value of manufactured dairy products, sets the basic formula price for December, January, and February at not less than \$4.26, which was used in calculating November 1966 prices. For March and April, the basic formula price will be not less than \$4.15. For May, June and July the price will be not less than \$4.05. If during these months the price for manufactured milk products reaches a higher level, then the higher price will be used in determining the fluid milk (Class I) prices. These prices are computed each month by adding specified differentials to

the basic formula price, or manufacturing milk average price for the preceding month at Minnesota-Wisconsin plants.

USDA announced that it is not making effective at this time the proposed amendments to the New York-New Jersey order because a sufficient number of producers through their cooperative associations have not yet approved the proposed amendments. In the federal order markets of the Northeast, where the farm prices for fluid milk are not based on the manufactured milk product values, USDA had proposed to take comparable action to limit price reductions in the New York-New Jersey Federal order the basic price guarantee now effective through March would have been extended through July 1967. The price levels in the Massachusetts-Rhode Island and Connecticut milk orders also will not be extended through July at this time, for they are tied to the level of the New York-New Jersey Class I price.

In addition to the general price actions, USDA is taking a number of individual milk marketing order actions based on special conditions in those order areas

The Washington, D.C., and Upper Chesapeake Bay order fluid milk (Class I) prices for December through June will be based on the Class I price of the Delaware Valley order. For December through March the Washington Class I price will be the same as the Delaware Valley price, \$6.40, and the Upper Chesapeake Bay Class I price will be 10 cents less. For April through June, the fluid milk (Class I) price in both markets will be 10 cents less than the Delaware Valley price. These price levels already prevail in these markets, officials said, because of negotiated agreement between producers and handlers. No change has been made in presently effective provisions of the Delaware Valley order.

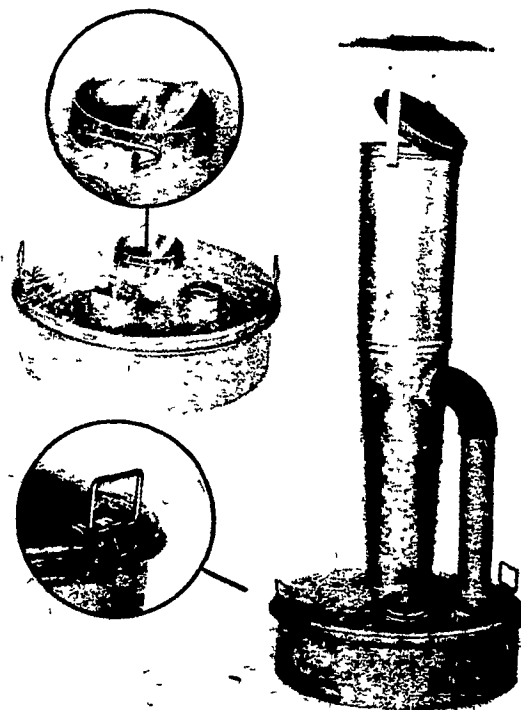
